Through October and November, we highlighted the critical work and ministry of Central Presbyterian Church in order to illustrate why financial giving is so critical. We also looked "under the hood" at what makes Central's finances work, and what we hope to accomplish next year. Each Sunday I say that **your gifts help us minister inside and outside our walls**, and I mean it. Your time, your creativity, your love, and your financial resources are all part of that. Now I want to say thank you. You stepped up over these last weeks and it shows. For those who have pledged, average pledges are up over 20%. Moses... at the Manger?



Throughout Fall, our children have been soaking up lessons about that ancient Israelite Moses - being set afloat on a river as an infant, running away from Egypt, being called back by a strange fiery shrub, and leading his people across a desert into freedom. They now know the ins-and-outs of not only Moses, but a whole cast of ancient Hebrews like Miriam, Aaron, Jethro, and that villainous Pharaoh.

So what happens when children so well-versed in the Hebrew Bible have to put on a pageant right out of the early pages of the New Testament? Is there room for a pillar of fire and a plague of frogs beside the manger?

That's how this year's Christmas pageant begins. Envisioned and written by Central's own Jeff Jones, our children and youth will bring to life not only the nativity story that we expect around Christmas, but also show us how the stories of the Exodus artfully connect with the story of Jesus' birth. How will the Israelite story of freedom help us understand the Incarnation in a whole new way? What threads knit the whole of Scripture into one great story about captivity, liberation, and new life?

And if this all seems like a bit much, don't worry. During the first two Sundays of Advent, you'll hear all about the ways that the Christmas story leans on the ancient stories of Israel, especially the Exodus. Join us this year as we celebrate the infant in a manger, born to lead his people on a new exodus to freedom.

Questions & Answers with Central's Hunger Ministry

FROM SHARON ZOPFI-JORDAN AND THE HUNGER INITIATIVE TASK FORCE

How long has the Hunger Initiative Task Force been in place?

In 2018, Central began discussing hunger needs and food insecurities in our neighborhood. We were blessed to receive a generous grant to help make a difference in this area. The grant funds have been used to support programs like Keystone, Hunger Solutions, Interfaith Action Dept of Indian Works, and many others, including assisting our friends at Central Towers.

What other things has the hunger grant helped support?

Central's Wednesday Community Lunch program has been a beneficiary of the grant. Funds have been used to help offset some of the costs when we have guests that are unable to donate for lunch. So far in 2023, this is over 400 people.

It has also helped by purchasing items for the snack packs Central gives out when we have visitors with hunger needs. Central's youth have helped with putting together the snack packs.

I see there was recently a food drive at Central to support Keystone's Rice Street Food Shelf. Have other food drives been held?

Yes, over the past 3 years we have held 4 food drives at Central. Prior to today's drive our congregation has donated well over 1000 pounds of food and over \$4600 in monetary donations to help local food shelves. The generosity here is amazing!

Are there volunteer opportunities available?

Just yesterday, 9 Central volunteers served lunch to over 260 people at the St. Paul Opportunity Center (formerly the Dorothy Day Center). It is a really rewarding experience to serve those needing a hot and nutritious meal. Central volunteers on the 2nd Saturday of the odd months for the lunch service. It would be great to have others join our efforts. If interested check out volunteer opportunities at the Central for Good website. We are discussing additional volunteer opportunities in 2024, so stay tuned.

Hunger is a more than a local issue. How has central looked beyond our local area?

The Central congregation has participated in the Bread for the World letter writing campaigns the past 2 years in support of the Farm Bill by writing letters to our US Senators and US Representatives. In 2023, 111 letters were sent and in 2022, 126 letters were sent. We have also provided financial donations from the grant for Bread for the World. World Central Kitchen has also been a beneficiary of the grant. WCK provides meals in response to humanitarian, climate and community crises.

How can others get involved?

We welcome others to join the task force or sign up for volunteer opportunities. Together we can make a difference to those in need.

HAVE YOU EXPERIENCED CENTRAL'S WEDNESDAY COMMUNITY LUNCH?

Each week, chef Barb Westman and her team of volunteers prepare a delicious menu for our Wednesday Community Lunch. Fresh breads, unforgettable soups, and delicious flavors are only part of what awaits the guests from the community eager to share a meal together.

If you have not yet experienced the Wednesday Community Lunch, we invite you to give it a try! Offered every Wednesday from 11:45 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., lunch is open to <u>everyone</u> in the community. There is a suggested donation of \$10 per person. However, all who are hungry are invited to eat, regardless of their ability to contribute.

If you get there early, you may also have the chance to purchase an extra loaf of bread to take home. (And trust me... you want it!)

Discussions with the Anti-Racism Task Force

Criminal Justice Conversation

The Anti-Racism Task Force expands on the December Faith Formation topic of Criminal Justice this month with a guest who has insight into the Minnesota prison system. The Rev. MJ Voytek will join us for lunch and conversation on December 17 at 11:45 a.m.

Rev. MJ Voytek (they/them) is a graduate of both Macalester College and United Theological Seminary of the Twin Cities. They have experience working in pastoral care and mental health settings, including 2.5 years as the Chaplain at Minnesota's only women's prison. Currently a ministerat-large after the end of that call, MJ brings a deepened knowledge of the law enforcement system's strengths and biases both to their visit to Central and to their work next summer as a commissioner from the Twin Cities to the denomination's General Assembly.

History Center Forums

Since 2004, History Forum at the Minnesota History Center has explored the richness, expansiveness, and complexity of American history with some of the nation's best scholars. The History Center Forums this year has several themes on racial issues.

DECEMBER 16: MUSLIMS IN THE HEARTLAND

Edward E. Curtis IV - scholar of Black, Muslim, and Arab American history and life - uncovers the surprising history of Muslim life in the American Midwest through multiple generations of Syrian American families. From the plains of the Dakotas to the factories of Motor City, Curtis' richly detailed history reveals Muslim Americans at the heart of key American institutions like the assembly line, the family farm, the dance hall, and the public school. This fresh portrayal of a familiar region reveals how, for over a century, Midwestern Syrians have created a

life that was Arab, Muslim, and American - all at the same time.

JANUARY 16: AMERICAN INDIANS & THE AMERICAN DREAM

In her groundbreaking history of the urbanization and suburbanization of Native communities in Minnesota, Kasey Keeler shows how American Indians have navigated the intersection of federal Indian policy and federal housing policy to access homeownership, particularly in the suburbs. From the Homestead Act of 1862 to the housing bubble of the early 2000s and today's Wall of Forgotten Natives, Keeler offers new ways to think about histories of place and placemaking for American Indians here in Minnesota and highlights the contradictions and limits of the ever-alluring "American Dream."

FEBRUARY 10: CHARLIE BROWN'S AMERICA

For nearly fifty years, Charles Schulz's Peanuts was a mainstay of American popular culture, with many arguing that it was beloved precisely because it was apolitical in a postwar period





MARCH 30: 13 CLOCKS - HOW RACE UNITED THE COLONIES

In his celebrated account of the origins of American unity, John Adams described July 1776 as the moment when thirteen clocks managed to strike at the same time. So how did these American colonies overcome long odds to create a durable union capable of declaring independence from Britain?

In this powerful history of the fifteen tense months that culminated in the Declaration of Independence, Robert G. Parkinson provides a troubling answer: racial fear.

Tracing the circulation of information in the colonial news systems that linked patriot leaders and average colonists, Parkinson reveals how the system's participants constructed a compelling drama featuring virtuous men who suddenly found themselves threatened by "ruthless Indians" and defiant slaves acting on behalf of the king.

APRIL 20: MAKING AMERICA'S PUBLIC LANDS


Environmental historian Adam Sowards traces the long history of public lands in the United States from the beginning of the republic to current events. The concept of "public" has always been one of competing visions and values, from homesteaders attempting to realize the ideal of the Jeffersonian republic, to western ranchers using the open range to promote free enterprise, to wilderness activists who see these lands as wild places, free from human encumbrance. Sowards deftly navigates the complex history of nearly 640 million acres of land and its intimate relationship to ongoing debates about our national identity, values, and politics.


