Congregational Meeting to be Held Feb 26

Rev. Chatelaine-Samsen has been invited to preach in worship on Sunday, February 26. This day will offer you the opportunity to meet him and hear his preaching style. Immediately after worship, there will



be a special congregational meeting called by Session. During this time, a vote of the congregation will be held to approve his proposed contract and accept him as Central Presbyterian Church's called pastor. During this time the decision to disband the Pastor Nominating Committee will also be made.

Assuming the vote will pass to accept him, the new pastor will be installed at a later date and begin his permanent placement at Central on April 1.

As outlined in our cover article, we will not welcome our new pastor to called ministry until April. In the meantime, Central will be in the hands of two bridge pastors to serve our worship and care needs until that time.

Following you will find a biography of the husband and wife team who will step into that role - Rev. Anne Fisher and Rev. Gregg Dana. Their first Sunday preaching at Central will be February 5 and they will serve until the called pastor is installed.

A Word from the Pastors

We are delighted to serve as Bridge Pastors at Central Presbyterian Church until the arrival of your new pastor, probably around April 1st. We are a retired Presbyterian clergycouple who live in St. Anthony Park.

Anne specialized in being a transitional pastor, serving 20+ congregations, including large urban churches and small rural churches. Gregg served as associate pastor of two large congregations before he got a master's degree in counseling and undertook a career in psychotherapy and family therapy. He maintained his role as a pastor by serving as parish associate at a church near their home in Gurnee, IL. We moved to the Twin Cities in 2016 for Anne to be the transitional pastor at Plymouth Presbyterian Church. She served Oak Grove Presbyterian Church in Bloomington from 2019-2021.



We are both preacher's kids, and three of our siblings and our daughter-in-law are clergy. We have four children: Robert (a department manager in a software company in Reston, VA), William (his team is responsible for the computer portal at the U of M), Liz (a freelance non-fiction copy-editor in Berlin, Germany), and Christina (a podcast producer for NASA in Washington DC). We have six grandchildren: Caroline 20, Mel 17, James 15, Henry 15, Charlotte 12, and Hugo 1. Anne's mother Ruth, nearing 100 years old, lives in memory care in Maplewood, so we visit her daily.

In addition to our church and Presbytery activities, we volunteer at our senior living cooperative. Anne works on the hospitality and library committees, and Gregg is a member of the cooperative living and energy committees.

Healthy living, working out, going for walks, and eating well are important to us. We enjoy reading books and participating in the conversations of book clubs. We enjoy traveling, especially to the Fisher family cottage in Fryeburg, Maine, and to visit our daughter and her family in Berlin. Using sustainable energy, recycling, composting, and driving a Volkswagen ID4 electric car are expressions of our seriousness about doing what we can about climate change.

a degree I also met my wife, Katie, an ELCA pastor.

I served as an associate pastor in the Georgetown neighborhood as well as mentored students at Wesley Theological Seminary in the midst of their own vocational journeys.

While we lived in DC, our daughter Junia was born. A few years later, my wife received a call to serve a congregation in Winona, MN, so we headed across the country to begin

work there. During this time, I served two congregations - one ELCA and one Moravian. Although we loved the bluff country around the Mississippi River, we both felt called back to more urban settings and moved to the Twin Cities this past year. Since then I've been serving as a transitional pastor.

I'm honored and excited by the call to Central. Central has been a steadfast presence in Minnesota's capital for generations pointing to God's faithfulness and call to love and serve. You innovate while standing on a long tradition of worship, education, arts, and

service. I look forward to the times we will eat together at St Paul's "best kept restaurant secret," be lifted up by the power of amazing music, speak up alongside those advocating for justice, learn with disciples of all ages, and more.


Statement of Land Acknowledgement Now Session Approved

FROM REV. LOU BENDER (CONVENER OF THE ANTI-RACISM TASK FORCE)

Central Presbyterian Church occupies the sacred land of the Dakota people.

This land embodies Dakota history, nurtures Dakota spirit, and for a long era sustained Dakota life. The Dakota people were harmed by the United States government through unjust and broken treaties. The government pursued strategies that cheated Dakota people and led to their dislocation and death. Government policies also led to genocide and destruction of the land for which the Dakota people are such faithful stewards. This harm includes the aftermath of the Treaties of Traverse des Sioux and Mendota. both signed in 1851, which led directly to the availability of this sacred space which we presume to possess today. These treaties between the United States government and various Dakota bands, signed in 1851, made the land available when the congregation, formed in 1853, was looking for property.

Central Presbyterian Church acknowledges that we reap the inherited benefits of evil down to this day. We who seek to be "in the city for good" cannot undo the past, no matter how much good we do. Our faith demands confession and atonement to set right the consequences of evil. Our faith demands action toward justice on behalf of the Dakota people, the Anishinaabe, the Winnebago, and others who have been hurt for our

advantage. Our faith demands love as a way of life, perceiving the image of the Christ in both those who harm us, and those whom we harm.

In response to the demands of faith, by action of the Session on January 17, 2023, Central Presbyterian Church declares the following commitments. The church:

- Commits to a policy of candid and thorough examination of history that recognizes the obligation to acknowledge even the parts of stories which are difficult to hear and would be easier to ignore.
- Takes a confessional stance about the evils of colonization (murder, genocide, broken trust, etc.) from which we and our

- ancestors and descendants all benefit.
- Pays respect to Dakota elders
 past and present, and to all their
 descendants, with thanks for all
 they contribute to our mutual well
 -being, particularly their care for
 the land.
- Urges our members to develop lasting, respectful relationships that support Native American communities and nations.
- Calls for continued action for the benefit of people of Native American descent through sweat equity, financial contribution, advocacy for public policy, and prayerful reflection on continuing actions.
- Reviews this commitment at least annually for the purpose of assessing congregational faithfulness to its commitments.

The Anti-Racism Task Force started talking about land recognition in June 2021. We now keep this truth in our minds and hearts as we move forward in worship and service as a faith community.

A Time to Reflect on Vocal Point

a time for war, and a time for peace.

This Ecclesiastes text speaks to these seasons of our lives and, as many of you know, our upcoming VocalPoint concerts on February 4 and 5 supporting Urban Roots will be my last one as the artistic director of VocalPoint. We have had quite a season together. To say that the last 12 (plus 7) years have been immensely fulfilling and rewarding is a significant understatement.

When a small group of us started this work as Global Harmony 19 years ago, none of us had any idea what was to come: beautiful friendships, incredible guest artists, powerful messages, music that changed our lives, and experiences that shaped who we are. While it's hard for me to

imagine a life without this work, I do believe that this particular endeavor is coming to an end for me.

The Right Partner, The Right Time

As I reflect on this time, I think Urban Roots was the perfect organization to partner with for a final season. If anything exemplifies the necessity of change, it's a garden. The seed becomes a seedling; the blossom becomes the fruit; the fruit becomes a meal. The garden is tended, the food is prepared, the harvest is shared.

Much like the work of a gardener, part of our work together as VocalPoint has been caring for something that really wasn't ours in the first place. We embraced the mission of great non-profits in our community, then listened closely to the stories of people who needed to be heard as well as the visions of leaders and modern day prophets who speak the truth. Then, we were the caretakers of your generosity as you've contributed hundreds of thousands of dollars throughout the years.

We tended, we grew, and we shared. And like a good meal, we've been filled.

Growing VocalPoint

When I came on staff here at Central in 2010, I had been directing Global Harmony. I knew then that I wanted to continue that work but it would need to adapt to this new setting. Session blessed the idea, and we became VocalPoint.

In our 12 years together, we have told important stories that are true, sometimes difficult, but always consequential. Central has been an amazing place to hold these concerts and we, as Central, have been blessed by the people who have shared their many talents here.

I am truly grateful for all the ways that this community has supported our efforts as we have come together each January and February to create something new - to listen profoundly to our neighbors, to hear songs within those stories, to provide a space for others to be amazingly generous, and to grow together in our humanity.

We have also learned to do hard things - more so in the last few years that's for sure - and together, we can walk through this time, too. While this chapter is coming to an end, there is much to celebrate.


The Final Concerts

Share Your Keys for Housing Change

Project-Based Vouchers

If someone is homeless in a metro suburb, the chance of ever living in deeply affordable housing is practically nil. ('Deeply affordable' refers to housing aimed at serving those who make 30% or less of the Twin Cities median income.)

To build multiple-unit, low-income housing, a contractor must have a project-based voucher for each separate living unit to be built. The project-based voucher stays with the unit, guaranteeing its low-income status over time for eligible applicants.

The Quandry

The Metropolitan Council receives project-based vouchers from the federal government and is responsible for distributing them to developers like Beacon who build low-income housing in the metro-area suburbs. Then why does the Metropolitan Council keep them locked up?

Unfortunately, the Met Council has never developed a policy for distributing these vouchers, especially for deeply affordable housing - so there's no commitment for allocating them. Thus, deeply affordable housing has not been built in the suburbs for the last two years.

Keys for Change

Beacon Interfaith Housing Collaborative is focusing on



correcting this situation because it prevents a clear solution to homelessness. It's time to unlock housing equity in the suburbs, and Beacon has a plan!

Beginning Sunday, February 5, please bring any and all old keys you don't need to the Friendship Room after worship. A Central Beacon member will be there with a big box to fill. Then, later this winter we will hold a Key Collection Workshop at Central. There we will share in a time to write messages to Met Council members on key tags attached to the keys we've collected.

Central's Beacon team members encourage everyone to participate in this campaign to show we believe everyone deserves a home and to help "unlock" project-based vouchers for deeply affordable housing in the metro suburbs.




