VOCALPOINT CONCERTS TO RAISE MONEY FOR LOCAL CAR REPAIR SHOP FOR LOW-INCOME FAMILIES

The beneficiary organization for VocalPoint's 2022 season is **The Lift Garage**, a 501c3 nonprofit aimed at moving people out of poverty and homelessness by providing low-cost car repair, free pre-purchase car inspections, and honest advice that supports our community on the road to more secure lives. They are located on Lake Street just steps from the Third Precinct. After Lake Street burned in the 2020 protests, The Lift Garage redoubled their

commitment to the community, purchasing their building which they had previously rented and expanded in order to serve more people. Since opening their doors in 2013, they have saved car owners \$1.1 million!

The 2020 benefit concerts will be: Saturday, February 5 at 4 p.m. Sunday, February 6 at 4 p.m.

Tickets are \$15 in advance/\$20 at the door for adults. They are available online and after worship, beginning January 16.

This month we are delighted to welcome the return of several popular musicians to worship.

The OK Factor

Playful and unexpected, new-classical crossover duo The OK Factor writes and performs folk-inspired music influenced by multiple genres, with an artistry that reveals their classical training. Cellist Olivia Diercks and violinist Karla Colahan find great joy in defying expectations and delivering an experience outside of what audiences anticipate from a cello and violin combo.

Organic and genuine, their original compositions feel both comfortingly familiar and uniquely fresh, and have been described as "genrebending" (Julie Amacher, MPR) and "pure magic" (Wausau Pilot & Review). The ease with which they write and perform and their passion

for educational outreach has caught the attention of the Minnesota music community in which they live and work, bringing them success on stages such as The Cedar Cultural Center, as frequent featured artists with Minnesota Public Radio, and as finalists for the McKnight Fellowships for Musicians in 2018.

Olivia and Karla invite audiences to explore music and cultivate a curiosity about its role in their lives.

Anthony Healy

As soon as pianist Anthony Healy was old enough to reach the keys, he has been drawn to and inspired by the power of the instrument. Frequently performing across the country, Anthony has a vast repertoire and is at ease in a variety of styles, including jazz, classical, blues, and pop. Born and raised in Westborough, Massachusetts, Anthony began playing songs by ear at age 4, starting with the theme

to the movie "Superman" (the greatest superhero of all time), and continuing on to works from all genres. Initially, Anthony played simply to entertain friends and family, but what started as a hobby soon developed into something more serious. By age 14, he was studying classical piano at The Boston Conservatory under Inna Muravnik. Anthony went on to earn a degree in music education with a piano performance focus, along with a minor in Italian studies, from Ithaca College. While pursuing his master's degree in jazz performance at Western Michigan University, Anthony studied with acclaimed pianist Jeremy Siskind, and also worked closely with the Music Education department. Anthony currently resides in White Bear Lake, Minnesota, teaching K-5 music at Afton-Lakeland Elementary in the Stillwater district, and maintaining his own private teaching studio.



COVID-19 Safety Protocol and Precautions

PROOF OF VACCINATION

Health and safety are our top priorities. VocalPoint will follow best practices from the Arts Partnership (Minnesota Opera, the Ordway, the SPCO and Schubert Club) which requires proof of either full COVID-19 vaccination or a negative COVID-19 test result taken within 72 hours prior to attending the concert.

MASK REQUIREMENT

Masks are required in the venue. This follows the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's recommendation that everyone should wear a mask indoors regardless of vaccination status.

Concerts to Feature Musician Chastity Brown

Chastity Brown is a storyteller in the blues tradition. The Minnesota-via-Tennessee songwriter and musician tells stories populated by marginalized characters to stake her own space as a queer black woman and to speak to other experiences oftentimes ignored.

The daughter of a black blues musician and white Irish mother who



was raised in Tennessee, she's made a home in Minneapolis for more than a decade. She was signed by Red House Records and released her acclaimed album Silhouette of Sirens in 2017 which was chosen as a "First Listen" by NPR. She's gone on to tour internationally and supported the Indigo Girls, Jayhawks, and Micheal Kiwanuka among others.

Chastity has toured as backing vocalist and opening band for Ani Difranco on US, UK, and EU tours. In 2019, she was chosen to perform alongside the MN Orchestra directed by Osmo Vanska, where she presented an evening of her original songs.

Featuring Visual Artist Cadex Herrera

You are probably familiar with Cadex Herrera's work as he was the lead artist for the iconic George Floyd Mural on Cup Foods in South Minneapolis. VocalPoint has commissioned Cadex to create two large banners for our concerts. He



will also be exhibiting his work in our Friendship Room Art Gallery.

Cadex's aspirations as an artist is that through his art he can bring awareness and dialogue to a small fraction of the many social injustices that are part of his reality.

Cadex believes social consciousness and art can be tools to exact positive change, as well as inspire to create and make a difference in our local as well as our global community.

Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage."

When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy.

On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

Epiphany is from the Greek word for to show or to make manifest. An epiphany is sometimes spoken of as a sudden realization or awareness. When we celebrate Epiphany in the church, we recall the Magi who followed the star and came to worship Emmanuel – God with us. It reminds us that Jesus is the Light of the World and fulfills the longing in us to walk in the light of God.

The other thing though about

Epiphany is that the Magi expected to find God in the palace in Jerusalem, not in a little out of the way town of Bethlehem.

Epiphany falls on January 6 every year, twelve days after Christmas. We will celebrate it in worship on Sunday, January 2nd. Please join us in worship that day to receive communion and a star word – a randomly chosen word for you to reflect on through the new year.

A NEED FOR GIVING




