Exciting News from the Poistor Nominating Committee

The PNC is pleased to announce that they have concluded their search for a new permanent Pastor of Central Presbyterian Church. You will hear more about the selected candidate soon. In the meantime, we want to share insight into the process used to arrive at this decision.

Defining Our Criteria

The PNC began meeting in April. Their first big task was to create a Ministry Information Form (MIF) for Central. This MIF is used by the Presbyterian Church's search system called the Church Leadership Connection (CLC). The PNC used the Ministry Study, created by all of you through focus groups and congregational discussions documenting our vision, values, mission, and beliefs to create our MIF. After the MIF was approved by the Presbytery, it was posted to the Presbyterian Church Leadership Connection (CLC) site.

Pastors interested to consider a new call complete a Personal Information Form (PIF). The CLC runs a search to identify potential candidates whose PIFs match key criteria in our MIF. This search generated about two dozen system matched candidates. Central also received about twenty self-referrals from pastors who reviewed our MIF and expressed interest in our pastor position.

Reviewing Applicants

After reviewing the PIFs of candidates, Central's PNC determined which candidates to contact. Because some candidates were system matched and not direct applicants to our church, the PNC had to contact them to find out if Central's role was one that they would consider.

The PNC utilized on line recordings of sermons and worship leadership to help review candidates. It was very helpful to be able to "see" candidates preach and speak, in addition to reviewing their PIF information. And, just as the PNC was reviewing our candidates via technology, candidates were doing the same thing by watching our recorded services, reviewing our website to learn about our church. Candidates were impressed by Central's web presence, and our Mission Study was a great tool to help people learn about us. The PNC was honored to be representing Central.

Narrowing the Field

The PNC narrowed their initial set of candidates to six and scheduled first round interviews. Following the first round of interviews they discussed their evaluations of the candidates and identified four candidates to schedule for second round interviews. Throughout the interview process, the PNC utilized Zoom, which allowed them to see one another and to record the interviews, so that members of the PNC who could not attend would be able to review the recordings.

A Choice Emerges

Finally, one candidate was identified that the PNC believe is the best match for us at Central. They met this candidate in person and gave them a

About the Beneficiary

Urban Roots has three main areas of focus, including:

CONSERVATION

Conservation youth interns support and improve green spaces around the East Side, and participate in the restoration of local parks through removal of displaced plant species, native seed collection and installation of native plants. They teach hands-on skills through the installation and maintenance of rain and pollinator gardens in public and private spaces.

Youth also engage in citizen science projects, such as insect surveys, water sampling, and forest inventories. Parks they help to restore include Bruce Vento Nature Sanctuary, Indian Mounds Park, Willowbrook Reserve, and Swede Hollow Park. Interns also helped establish and maintain the Harvest Park Native Seed Garden, located in Maplewood.

maintain, and harvest small-scale crop production within their urban gardens. Urban Roots promotes entrepreneurship by teaching youth interns to manage gardens and crops for distribution to community supported agriculture (CSA) shares, Farmers Market, Roots for the Home Team, hunger relief efforts, youth families, restaurants and small-batch food preservation for seasonal sales. Program participants are also involved in creating sales and marketing materials for the Farmer's Market and other retail outlets.

COOK FRESH

In the "farm-to-table" paradigm, Cook Fresh is the table to Market Garden's farm. Working with seasonal crops from local farms, including and especially Urban Roots' own, interns learn valuable skills in food preparation, safety, and planning.

 NUTRITION: Working with students from the University of Minnesota's School of Public Health, interns learn about nutrition principles that will last them a lifetime and, person by person, help us build a healthier community.



CAREER PREPARATION: Cooking alongside chefs and other food professionals in the community, interns learn about different career paths available to them in hospitality, food policy, food media, and entrepreneurship, among other fields.

CULTURAL IMPORTANCE OF FOOD: By examining their own culture's dishes, those of the other cultures in their community, and foods from around the world, Cook Fresh interns learn about the cultural importance of food and cooking. Working with community chefs, interns help to document the food stories of the world around them.

Anti-Racism Norking Towards a Land Acknowledgement

In March, 2021, I traveled to Mankato to see a play that a friend was directing. They said the most interesting thing before the play started. A radio voice made the usual announcements about turning off your phone, of course, and then they said, "This university is built on Dakota land." They went on, but that's all I really heard. This place is built on Dakato land. I had no idea that statement ushered in the beginning of a whole new world.

Exploring a Land Acknowledgement

The Anti-Racism Task Force started talking about land recognition in June of 2021. It was one project among many, and truthfully we thought we would probably write a statement by August, sponsor a museum visit in September to engage the congregation, maybe read a book, take a statement to session in October, publish in the November newsletter, celebrate, and be done with it by Advent. And God laughed, and said, "No, you don't get it yet!"

Digging Into History

A little research established that the building at 500 Cedar Street is the second built for our use on the site, the first having been destroyed by fire. The lot is part of a huge parcel of land claimed by the U.S. Government by treaty in 1851. We shared our early spaces with the newly forming Minnesota government, and they shared spaces with us.

As usual in discussing history, the real story was hidden behind the dates and names. That treaty in 1851 was established with terms undeniably favorable to the government. Payments were then captured to pay for government rations that were to go to the Dakota people.

By the time the Civil War came around, federal resources were diverted into other parts of the country, and the payments stopped. Without the payments, the government agent would not release the goods, and the Dakota people starved, even though the storehouse was full of food. And God sighed, and said, "Are you starting to get it?"

Looking Inward

Our congregation was established in 1853, among the first institutions in Minnesota to claim a portion of the treaty land. We did some good things in the city as it grew. We continue to do good things now. I could name them all there, and no one would argue with the statements.

But the price for that good has been very heavy, both for the original inhabitants of the land, and for the settlers whose hearts could not comprehend the harm they were doing.

We are learning more, so we need to do better.

We need to tell the truth about history, even the parts that cast us or our ancestors in shame. We need to recover a keener sense of land stewardship, which we could have learned from the Dakota, had we been ready to listen. We need to make the inner journey that leads us to work for justice for our Indigenous relatives. And God nodded, and said, "Now you are starting to get it."

Moving Forward

Out of a sense of profound gratitude, the Central Anti-Racism Task Force is ready to write a land recognition statement for Session's consideration. We are ready to set before the congregation and the community the resources we have used to learn and grow, in hopes that others may accompany us on the journey. We are ready to make an ongoing commitment to partnership with and on behalf of Minnesota's Indiaenous peoples, even as we also embrace and work alongside other peoples who have come to be with us through other avenues. With gratitude to God for the way this journey of faith has changed our lives, we can hardly wait to hear what God tells us next!

Watch for the first major installment of our work to come forward, and join with us as we work toward liberty and justice for all.

Update from Finance & Stewardship Committee

It is also a very busy month for the Finance and Stewardship team as they prepare next year's budget and wrap up the past year's financial obligations. There are projects and missions both big and small, impactful and mundane.

2023 Stewardship: Growing in Faith

The stewardship theme Growing in Faith launched our congregation into planning for the exciting year ahead, with a goal to build a balanced budget. While a small part of the funding for the budget comes from earnings from Central's endowment, the bulk of it is from contributions from church and community members.

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Beacon Sets Three Priorities for the New Year

It's a New Year and Central's Beacon Leadership Team is formulating its Beacon action goals for 2023!

We will continue to learn and inform about Minnesota's housing crisis that results in individuals and families living outside. Imagine... living outside! (The temperature here in downtown St. Paul is 8 degrees as this article is being written.)

Central is a collaborative member of Beacon Interfaith Housing, the largest Minnesota non-profit affordable housing advocacy group made up of 100 faith congregations. We aren't asked to build affordable housing on our own (although years ago, Central did develop Central Towers, and Dayton Avenue Presbyterian developed Liberty Plaza). Instead, our faith values and voices are needed to convey an urgent commitment to house the homeless among us.

This is focused into three priority areas for the coming year.

PRIORITY ONE Legislate Change

The MN State Legislature will soon begin its 2023 Session. Last year, even with a \$9 billion surplus, the senate was quiet about the housing crisis. This year, voters have elected leaders who are committed to housing justice in the Senate, House, and Governor's office. We are ready to be the peoples' voice in righting the systemic wrongs of housing



insecurity with bold new policies like Bring It Home, Minnesota that guarantees rental assistance for the poorest among us. What a powerful and desperately needed way "to love our neighbors as ourselves!" Soon we will be sharing ways to reach our state legislators (with its \$18 million surplus) about the need for everyone to have a home and the great cost to society when our neighbors are homeless or housing insecure.

Until then, we invite you to join us at the Housing Rally in the Capitol Rotunda on Wednesday, January 11 from 1:30-2:30 p.m. Help us speak out and rally for equitable and stable housing in Minnesota. For more legislative information, contact Margaret Celette or Barb Swanson!

PRIORITY TWO Construct Homes

We are excited about Gladstone Crossing, Beacon's proposed deeply affordable housing development in Maplewood for young homeless families. Imagine a Project Home family learning they would be in their own home in this new development! Gladstone will offer 40 high-quality, well-managed apartment homes for families who make less than \$30,000 a year.

A Gladstone Crossing Campaign Action Team of Beacon leaders across the east metro are meeting and developing relationships with Maplewood city leaders, staff and city commissions. This city and community relationship building is important and takes time. An official vote for approval of zoning change/ land use by the mayor and council is anticipated for late spring of 2023.

PRIORITY THREE Improve Access

This year, Beacon will tackle the greatest barrier for construction of needed, deeply-affordable homes: The lack of project vouchers. If you live in a suburb of the Twin City metro area, the Metropolitan Council holds a project voucher for each individual housing unit planned for low-income people within its boundaries. Without the project vouchers, a developer can not build affordable housing.

A goal of Beacon this year is to work with the Met Council to free up, or "unlock" their project vouchers. In the coming months, we will be sharing more information on project vouchers, why they're such a challenge, and why the lack of them for the suburbs is a racial equity issue.

Old Keys Can Open New Doors!

Do you have old keys floating around in your junk drawers or mystery keys on your key rings? Donate old keys you have no use for to the church office!! Central's Beacon Leadership Team is collecting them for the "Unlock the Met Council" drive to raise awareness with legislators and decision makers as to the need for deeply affordable housing outside the urban core.


