Foith Formation - Economic Rights

The idea of economic rights is foreign to many Americans, but the idea of rights to housing, food, employment, and other economic needs are an important part of the global landscape since the Second World War. In an age of increasing economic insecurity for people on the margins, this conversation is as important as ever.

Yet the Bible was written thousands of years ago in largely agrarian economies, so what could it say about a modern economy in the wake of thinkers like Adam Smith, John Maynard Keynes, and John Nash? Does the Bible have anything meaningful to say about an idea as seemingly new as economic rights.

Join us on January 7 in the upstairs

meeting room at 11:30 a.m. for a discussion encompassing the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, ancient Hebrew law, and implications for policy in the modern world for the ability of people to have basic economic security.

An Anti-Racism Perspective

FROM REV. LOU BENDER, CONVENER OF ANTI-RACISM TASK FORCE

Acquiring and maintaining wealth becomes a racial issue when inheritance is interrupted - through unlawful seizure of lands, loss of property during refugee resettlement, disparity in compensation for land involved in eminent domain, or other circumstances that cause families of color to move.

Save the date for Sunday, January 28 at 11:45 a.m. to hear about

potential remedies as Rev. Lou Bender, Leon Oman, and other Anti-Racism Task Force members share information and lead discussion about reparations. Included will be review of a legislative proposal in Minnesota to create a large Indian Recovery Fund through a small fee when land is bought and sold (deed tax) - something for which Central members will soon be able to advocate. If time permits, we will also do some brainstorming of other economic justice actions we can be involved in, as inspired by Pastor Chris's Adult Faith Formation talk earlier in the month.

Continuing the Nork of Central Closet

For 24 years people of Central and many individuals and organizations around the Twin Cities contributed women's clothing to Martha's Closet. Under the leadership of Cheryl McDermott and then Sandy White, the clothing helped women entering or re-entering the workforce.

In 2022, Martha's Closet was officially closed so that its space upstairs could be repurposed for children and youth educational programs. It was not yet decided what should happen next as there were clothes to disperse, racks, hangers, and shelving to re-purpose.

By fall it became apparent that people attending the Community Wednesday Lunch were in need of warmer clothing. It seemed logical to make Martha's Closet left-over warm clothing available to them. A lower level space was assigned to store rolling racks and tables, and after a clean-out of space in the dining room, a workable space for clothing distribution was created.

Volunteers were recruited and the new name "Central's Closet" was chosen. Though we didn't heavily publicize this new focus, we invited church members to contribute new or slightly used items to the supply. In December 2022, Central's Closet opened during our lunch hours.

We are grateful to our volunteers who assisted in this transformation, including Rev. Carol Reed, Chris and Kelly Smith, Heidi Jernstedt, Sydney Linderman, Elaine Oman, Peter Evarts, Virgie Bundy, Roger Grussing, Lynne Severson, Jennifer Anderson, Anna Sanchez, Maggie Gordon and many others.

Volunteers sorted and hung up useable donated items. On Wednesday and third Sundays they roll the racks of clothing up from the basement storage room to the dining room corner and help customers find what they need. Sydney Linderman, Gayle Smith, Lynne Severson, and Heidi Jernstedt have put in lots of volunteer hours for which we are so grateful. Others that have answered the call for help have been Al and Florette Hujanen, Lynda Petrie, Maggie Gordon, Joan Kelly, Jane Lonergan, and Roger Grussing.

A new year is before us. We hope one or two of you will feel called to serve this important mission during Wednesday or Third Sunday lunches. The time commitment is 11:00 to 1:00 on Wednesdays or 11:30 to 1:00 on the third Sunday of the month. The responsibilities are to set up the corner of the dining room with clothing racks rolled up from the storage room, greet and assist clients, then return racks and bins to the storage room.

Exciting News From Beacon

The Beacon Team is thrilled to announce that Gladstone Crossing has received \$14.7 million from the Minnesota Housing Finance Agency! Gladstone Crossing is a planned 40-unit affordable supportive housing development in Maplewood. The intended resident population is young families exiting homelessness (those where the primary parent is under age 24). Thanks to Central Presbyterian Church and other Beacon congregations, Gladstone had a successful land acquisition this past July, and this funding is a huge step forward in Gladstone's development.
