The Joy Offering supports Presbyterian - related schools and colleges equipping communities of color like Stillman College - a Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU) and to provide life-changing experiences for graduates in an ever changing world. Half of the offering supports the schools, and the other half provides assistance for current and retired church workers and their families with critical financial needs.

Honoring God's Gift

By giving to the Joy Offering, you honor God's gift of Jesus Christ by providing assistance to Presbyterian related endeavors. There are numerous examples depicting just how important our "Joy Offerings" help God's children. One such example of the beauty of giving to this campaign is seen through the eyes of Rose Bryant who took a leap of faith that led to divine intervention for her.

Personally, I can relate to the struggles Rose encountered as I too attended a HBCU. Instead of receiving a grant via Joy Offering as Rose did, I received a personal grant from an already struggling family member to attend a HBCU in NC. She wanted me to succeed as did one of Rose's professors at Stillman College in Alabama. Instead of facing the struggles of working and taking care of a child with a dream of completing her degree in education, I received my degree in History and Government with a minor in Education. We both became certified teachers.



Engaging and promoting this Joy Offering brings us closer together as members and allows us to connect more deeply with those in need of assistance, like Rose Bryant.

Giving at Work

Rose was a single parent raising a young son.

She was expecting that a new work opportunity was supposed to open up so many doors for her. Rose worked for AT&T and was in a manager training program and expected to open her own store one day. When her boss noticed that she didn't have a bachelor's degree, she could no longer stay in the program or run a store. Rose realized not finishing school was impacting her growth.

Knowing she had to take a leap of faith, Rose resigned from her job. She needed money but, after years in retail, wanted something that would allow her to spend more time with her son. She decided to be a substitute teacher, which meant getting her transcript from Stillman College.

Bryant had attended the school in 2003 but wasn't really sure what she wanted to do, so she left. A few years later, she found out she was pregnant and had to keep working to support her son - setting aside her dream of finishing college. That all changed in 2015.

Rose grew up in Tuscaloosa and finally, in 2019 she graduated with a Bachelor's degree in education. She did so well that she landed a job

three months before finishing school. She now works as a seventh-grade English and language arts teacher for the Dallas Independent School District in Dallas.

Bryant credits that, in part, to the financial aid received through programs like the Joy Offering.

"That support not only kept me in school, but it allowed me to take part in programs during the summers," Bryant explained. "I went to cities like Boston and Washington, D.C., and learned from people at places like John Hopkins University. It helped create a special education curriculum at an Indiana public school district and took part in teacher development programs in Minnesota. I was exposed to new ideas that made me not only more marketable, but more well-rounded."

Bryant doesn't want people to overlook the importance of schools like Stillman College to those who attend classes. "Give as much as you can because it always helps," she said. "Stillman is a place where those who live way out in what we call the Black Belt of Alabama can experience new things and grow in a way that's not overwhelming. But sometimes you don't know what you don't know until you have the opportunity to learn."

2020 is already a big year for Bryant. She's not only doing what she loves, but she's engaged and her son Aaron - who is now 13, helped with the proposal - and she just bought her first house.

Rose doesn't think she would be here without the support of Stillman. She stated that the amazing thing is that all of this has a ripple effect. She was able to finish my goal because of the support she received.

GOD'S CARING FOR ALL CREATIONS

The earth is the Lord's and all that is in it; the world, and those who live in it...

[PSALM 24:1]

One Saturday afternoon in June, I was out on my little patio when I heard a pair of cardinals making a great deal of noise. I had been watching this pair for several weeks. The female cardinal had been hard at work building a nest in my rose trellis, adding in impossibly long pieces of twigs and straw, somehow flying in and out of the tangled collection of branches in the climbing rose. As a friend commented to me, it was amazing to see how birds with a beak and two feet can make such perfect nests for their families to be born and raised in.

Cardinals lay one egg a day and the female will sit on the eggs only after all the eggs are laid. When I observed the female sitting on the nest, I knew her brood was on its way. Eventually she seemed to become accustomed to my presence out in the garden. One day I heard quiet chirping coming from the roses and knew at least one baby bird had hatched.

That Saturday afternoon as I watched the male and female cardinal hopping around excitedly in the adjoining tree, I also noticed movement in the rose. I sat very still watching, and after a time noticed a flutter. The parents were apparently encouraging the baby bird to leave the nest, to try out its wings. Eventually a young bird fledged and



flew awkwardly to a nearby shrub. The rest of the afternoon and into the evening every time I went out onto the patio, I saw the male and female cardinal hovering around the fledgling, bringing it food as it floundered in the shrub, then in the ground cover, not quite strong enough to fly away.

I have had many birds nest in my yard over the years, but I have never seen the exact moment the baby leaves the nest. As I watched the moment happening in front of me, I thought of how the Bible talks about God's care for the birds and for all of creation, the descriptions of God caring for us as a mother bird cares for her young, protecting and caring and gently nudging us to grow.

This summer we have a theme in worship of God's beautiful creation. We are looking for you to submit objects or images of how you are experiencing God out in creation. Bring an interesting rock you find, a small bottle of water from your favorite lake or river, take a photo of something that captures your attention, whatever speaks to you

about God's presence. Then watch as the "tree" – the art installation – begins to grow in the sanctuary.

Blessings to you as you enjoy this summer and the beautiful creation God has given us.

Worship, Music & Arts

CHAIR: DENNY REIMER

This committee oversees the bigpicture of all worship planning, including monthly coordination of communion preparation. They also drive our artist collaborations and feature exhibitions.

Children & Youth

CHAIR: PHYLLIS BRASHLER

This committee oversees all the programs that Central offers for children and youth, and their families.

Finance & Stewardship

CHAIR: CHRIS SMITH

This committee analyzes and recommends the strategic use of

financial resources. With the treasurer, this committee interprets income, expenses and financial realities and priorities to the boards and to the congregation. This committee will create and implement a stewardship campaign in the fall to increase participation in the life of the church.

Welcome & Fellowship

CHAIR: KIERA FAYE

Formerly known as the New Members & Volunteers committee, this group will engage visitors, host classes for new members, and help new members assimilate. In addition, this committee is charged with recruiting and training volunteers for ongoing hospitality tasks in the church (such as ushers and coffee servers).

Personnel

This committee is responsible for ensuring effective staffing for the church, and to oversee an annual evaluation process for each staff member. Some aspects of the work of this committee is confidential.

Coordinated Mission

CHAIR: SHARON ZOPFI-JORDAN

Central is very active in mission and or community outreach, through the use of our building, our dollars, and our volunteer time. The job of this committee is to coordinate, implement and execute our mission and community serving efforts, so that we can be most effective.

Facilities Management & Risk Assessment

CHAIR: CARL WILLIS

This committee addresses building and safety issues. Thanks to a recent grant from the Minnesota Historical Society, this committee has been helping to coordinate the assessment and renovation work to the our building exterior and other necessary projects.

Nominating Committee

CHAIR: MEL LEACH

This is a committee, not of the Session, but of the entire congregation. Usually meeting in the fall, it is charged with discerning whom God is preparing to serve as elders and deacons.

Presbytery Commissioners

Central is eligible to send two voting commissioners to presbytery meetings. Some churches elect commissioners (and alternates) to serve for a year; others select commissioners on a rotating basis. Presbytery meetings are held on Tuesdays or Saturdays five times each year in churches from across the presbytery (which stretches from Rochester to Hudson, WI). This can provide greater awareness about the work of the church beyond Central.

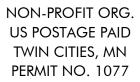
