GROWTH IN THE SUMMER SEASON

God's glory is on tour in the skies, God-craft on exhibit across the horizon.

Madame Day holds classes every morning, Professor Night lectures each evening.

[PSALM 19:1-2, THE MESSAGE]

Our summer months fall on the church calendar in what is referred to as Ordinary Time. The liturgical color for this season is green, reminding us that even a season without special days like Easter and Christmas, it can be a season of growth. Those of us who live in a northern climate know how much growth occurs outside in

this season as we can almost watch things grow in our gardens and dandelions seem to sprout overnight!

There are certain plants I associate with different places I have visited or lived. When I lived in South Korea, I became very familiar with the ginkgo tree. The ginkgo has such a beautiful distinctive leaf, its veins fanning out toward the rim of the pyramidal leaf.

The ginkgo is sometimes referred to as a living fossil because it is one of the oldest living tree species in the world – fossils of a ginkgo have been found dating to the time before dinosaurs! The ginkgo is native to China but grows well in our climate. The shape of the leaf, their heartiness, plus their beautiful golden color in the fall means they have become common ornamental trees in our country. (If you consider planting one in your own yard, confirm it is a male tree; the female variety produce a seed with an unpleasant odor.)

My prayer for all is to have a peaceful, restful summer season, and that you will feel God's presence in this amazing world God created!

A GLIMPSE AT FINANCES

Following is a quick look at key financial metrics as we reach the mid-point of the year.

As of the end of May, Central was over \$23,000 ahead for the year, largely due to a generous donation that arrived in May. Because of this donation, overall pledges are also ahead for the year.

Utilities are running over budget due to recent price hikes, but many other budget categories are even, or under budget year-to-date. Central's investments have been under pressure due to recent market declines, but Central's finance committee made recent trades to ensure the availability of next year's \$60,000 worth of Program Account money for staffing support.

Central is over halfway to its \$30,000 goal for collecting matching funds for the 2023 building grant to repair brick tuckpointing.

HUNGER INITIATIVE UPDATE

Back on an early April Sunday, many Central members spent their worship fellowship time after worship writing letters to their members of Congress in urgent support of a Global Malnutrition bill. Well, good news! This bipartisan Act passed the U.S. House of Representatives in late April! Overwhelmingly, in fact - the vote was 384-44. It will make existing U.S. global nutrition programs even more effective and support countries in their efforts to

prevent and treat child malnutrition. Rev. Eugene Cho, President of Bread for the World (our advocacy leader) called this bill "a game change". Even before the Ukraine war, malnutrition was responsible for nearly half of all preventable deaths among children under 5 globally." The proposed legislation now awaits action by the U.S. Senate.

In a separate action, Congress approved \$5 billion dollars in a Ukrainian aid bill to address the global food and malnutrition crisis,

an action Bread for the World enthusiastically advocated for and welcomed.

The Hunger Task Force thanks all of the Central members who sent letters and emails in support of our first Offering of Letters campaign with Bread for the World. We look forward to future efforts, including preparing for the massive Farm Bill which will take shape in the fall.

DONATION DRIVE FOR CARE PACKAGES

Last month we shared a new initiative to create care packages for our neighbors. In partnership with the Coordinated Missions Committee, Central's youth groups are going to be overseeing the coordination of new care packages that we offer to those who come to Central asking for food, hygiene items, or winter items such as hats and mittens.

Donations Needed

Starting on July 17, we will begin accepting donations for the care package contents. The following items are in need and those donations can be brought to the Friendship Room:

Unopened small hygiene items: A perfect use for those hotel samples and travel size soaps, toothpaste, toothbrushes, lotion, Kleenex packs, Chapstick, etc.

Reusable bags and backpacks: We find that nearly everyone who comes to Central asking for items also asks for a good bag to put it in. Canvas, nylon, etc.—think of the bags that you might get from donating to your favorite non-profit organizations. If you have an extra, consider donating it to this project!

Winter gear: Hats, mittens, scarves (gently used) and especially socks (new). Warm socks (such as white athletic socks) are ALWAYS in need and a common item that goes overlooked when people donate.

We will be purchasing snack items (with funds from the Hunger Initiative) such as granola bars, nuts, fruit snacks, etc. to include as well.

Save the Date

All ages are invited to join us after worship on August 14 to assemble the new care packages. These will be kept on hand in the church office and given to people who are in need. Central's youth groups will continue this project on an ongoing basis, so you can continue to donate hygiene items, bags, and winter gear throughout the year, and we will assemble the care packages as supplies dwindle.



UPDATE ON THE BRICK RESTORATION

Thanks to a strong response from our members and community, we are already more than two-thirds to the goal of \$30,000! As of June 16, we have received \$20,320 in gifts and pledges. We are so grateful for your support!

This next phase of restoration work would begin in 2023, and focus on replacing and repairing most of the bricks and stone on the east side of the building. While not very visible, fixing the crumbling walls is vital to maintaining the structural integrity of the entire building. The total cost is estimated at \$210,000.

The Minnesota Historical and Cultural Heritage Grants program (also known as Legacy Grants) was created to provide financial support for projects that preserve Minnesota's history and culture. This state-funded program is made possible by the Arts and Cultural Heritage Fund using sales tax revenue resulting from the Clean Water, Land, and Legacy amendment created through the vote of Minnesotans on Nov. 4, 2008.

While having matching funds is not required to apply for a grant, the amount of funds an organization can


raise demonstrates their community's buy-in commitment to a project. A match also demonstrates a community's investment in seeing a project through to completion, and can be a measure of an organization's capacity to carry out their project and of the project's long-term sustainability. Having matching funds can be a tiebreaker in particularly competitive grants rounds.

If we reach our goal of \$30,000 before the grant application due date of July 15, and along with \$31,000 that Central currently has available for Building Restoration projects, we will be able to fully fund



30% of the total cost of the project. This will make our application very competitive and hopefully have a much higher chance of being approved. If you have not yet contributed, please consider donating to help us reach our goal! While any amount is welcome, we still need many "Brownstone" donations of \$500 or "Bricks" at \$50 to get there. Your donation is fully tax-deductible, and will help preserve Central for generations to come. Simply drop a check in the mail or offering basket, or at the office, with "Restoration" in the memo. WELCOME GUITARIST JIM FALBO

Central is currently ironing out details to welcome guitarist Jim Falbo back to worship this August. (We were still lining up the music schedule as this newsletter went to print, but we hope to announce details soon.) In the meantime, worshippers at Central may remember Jim from his last visit to play in worship in 2019. For those just now coming to know him, Jim is an eclectic and accomplished classical/acoustic guitarist, composer, instructor, performer, and music arranger from St. Paul.

Jim's music has been featured on Classical MPR 99.5 KSJN and 88.5 KBEM Jazz radio throughout Minnesota. Jim started playing guitar at the age of 11 after growing up listening to Led Zeppelin, Eric Clapton, The Beatles, and many 90's alternative bands on the radio. His love of many forms of music developed into a passion for classical

and acoustic guitar, when he studied with guitarist Dean Harrington at K & S Conservatory of music. Jim has received shining reviews and is well known as a "guitarist's guitarist" from audiences and musicians alike. Jim possess the ability to play such a wide range of genres and styles, including classical European, Latin, contemporary, gypsy jazz, world music, pop classics, and acoustic fingerstyle guitar. Jim is a high demand and award-winning performer and plays in many settings including concerts, weddings, corporate events, and various other venues and events throughout the Twin Cities and Upper Midwest.

He has played in various guitar society events including the annual Classical Guitarathon and Minnesota's Local Artists Series, as well as a Classical Minnesota Public

Radio's Pop-Up Classical series. Jim draws a loyal following to his intimate and entertaining concerts, which many describe as "simply inspiring." His performances attract a wide variety of listeners throughout Minnesota while performing pieces from his expansive and distinct repertoire. Jim has written and recorded several works for the guitar. His compositions are heavily influenced from the romantic era, with European, South American, and even flamenco guitar influences. He has recorded four albums - Strings of Passion (2008) Sounds of Europe (2013), Latin American Guitar Legends (2014) and his most recent release Guitar Reveries (2016).

Jim currently resides in Burnsville, MN, and he enjoys rooting for the affable losers of the local sports scene when he's not playing music.

If you have not yet paid your Per Capita for the year, our next payment for the denominational support is \$9,167. As of this date, we have only received \$2,654 from Central members to cover that expense. Per capita payment is \$36.50 per member and can be given through offering or direct to the office by denoting 'per capita' in the check memo field or envelope.


