

Baptismal Waters at Flood Stage

It was my great joy on one of my first Sundays here, among many things, to be part of the baptism of baby Jyri.

If you were in worship that morning, you'll remember that the children in worship put cups of water in the baptismal font as we prepared for the baptism. It was a wonderful reminder that the sacrament of baptism is something we do as a community of all ages.

What you may not have noticed is that the font nearly overflowed with the amount of water that the children poured in. Like, right at the top.

Nobody trip or bump into it. When Jennifer and I planned on this, what we hadn't planned for was how many children would be there that Sunday. As each came forward to pour their cup of water in, my first reaction was to be nervous.

What if it really does overflow? And then my nerves were replaced with



joy. The hardest problem we had at that moment was that there were too many children in worship to celebrate this baptism. That we had to share this moment for more time than we'd planned. That the waters of baptism might actually overflow.

I can't think of a better image for Central right now.

The waters of baptism – the sign and seal of God's love – overflowing. We saw it together on Youth Sunday, and then with our Spark! kids the following week. We hear it week after week in the powerful music both from up front and from the congregation. Shared meals in the dining room. Celebrations of years of faithful ministry, and planning for years of ministry yet to come.

You have sustained this congregation into a season of new and growing abundance. It doesn't mean there won't still be challenges to live into, but it does mean that this is a time for celebration and anticipation, with God leading us on.

- ensure clear procedures in the case of an emergency (such as a tornado, fire, or medical emergency).
- A safety drill will be scheduled for after worship on a Sunday to test run new procedures.

An Offering of Letters for Bread for the Norld

The Friendship Room was buzzing after worship on April 23 as the Hunger Initiative Task Force held its second annual Offering of Letters. This year's effort, in partnership with the Christian advocacy organization, Bread for the World, focused on the renewal of the federal Farm Bill. The correspondence with elected officials continues with 117 letters and emails being sent so far, mostly going to Senators Klobuchar and Smith, and to Representative Betty McCollum. Representatives Craig, Omar, and Emmer were also contacted by Centralites who live in their districts.

The overall goal of this year's push is to support legislation that builds a healthy, equitable, and sustainable food system. Specific policies highlighted included increasing access to fresh fruits and vegetables through SNAP (formerly known as food stamps); eliminating barriers to SNAP for marginalized populations, e.g. former drug


offenders and indigenous communities; increasing support for Black farmers; keeping food out of landfills through recovery efforts and addressing threats to food security, like extreme weather; and supporting funding for international food aid programs.

Thank you, Central! The Hunger Task Force will keep you informed in the coming months about progress on this legislation - as well as further opportunities to impact hunger, both in this country and abroad.











Managing the Summer Heat at Central

Minnesota summers are glorious, with sunny skies and warm air brightening our moods and our beautiful sanctuary at Central. But the heat can sometimes make our worship space uncomfortable, even unsafe, for those sensitive to extreme temperatures.

Planning Ahead

During the late summer months in past years, when temperatures would reach the 90's, we occasionally made the decision to move Sunday worship to the air-conditioned Friendship Room for everyone's safety and comfort. While worshipping in the Friendship Room provided unique opportunities for people to sit closer together, the room itself restricted our capacity and music capability, so the preference was to worship as often as possible in the sanctuary.

This summer, with live-streaming capabilities in place, we have decided not to move services. On hot, humid days, we will still worship in our beautiful sanctuary to accommodate our live-stream videography and music needs. Those who wish can join us online from the comfort of their homes!

Our Complex Building


This summertime heat issue is somewhat, relatively new: before the energy-crisis of the 1970's, Central had a natural ventilation system that kept air moving and the sanctuary less hot. Large wooden ventilation shafts ran through the upper level of the building (alongside the old chapel), bringing cooler outside air into the sanctuary under the dome. Many of the stained-glass windows could open, allowing air movement. Vents in the cupola could be opened (or shut in winter) to allow hot air to escape. But with the need to conserve energy, and the remodeling of the old chapel, the ventilation shafts on the upper level were removed; the windows in the sanctuary were bolted shut and covered with acrylic panes on the outside for insulation and protection. The cupola vents are still functional, and can be open and shut as the seasons change. But with no fresh air intake, the sanctuary can sometimes feel like an oven.

The Facilities Management and Risk Assessment Committee has investigated the possibility of airconditioning the sanctuary, but it is cost prohibitive at this time, with other more pressing building restoration needs taking priority.

What You Can Expect

We have several tools to keep everyone more comfortable through the summer months. In addition to hand-held fans for people to use, we position two large fans to move air effectively, and have several smaller, quiet oscillating fans that can stay on during worship. The nursery and preschool room on the upper level are air-conditioned, so our children can stay cool. The air-conditioned Friendship Room is a welcome respite to enjoy fellowship after worship.

If at anytime you have concerns about the heat or need assistance while in worship at Central, we encourage you to speak with an usher. And of course, our services are live-streamed each week, which will allow members and friends to join us remotely from home and stay safe and cool during the hottest Sundays!

Beacon Team Celebrates a Win for Bring It Home, Minnesota!

Central member Maureen Smith said it best, "Advocacy in action, and a win for people who need help getting housing."

Thanks to the support and advocacy efforts of Beacon member churches, the Minnesota Senate and House has approved ongoing funding for the first-ever general rental assistance vouchers program in the state:

Bring It Home, Minnesota!

So what does this historic win mean?

- \$65 to 73 million in yearly funding for rental assistance vouchers between 2024 - 2027.
- 5.5 thousand additional rental assistance vouchers available between 2024 - 2027.

So, for the lowest earning households in Minnesota, vouchers ensure they won't pay over 30% monthly income on rent.



Remember the keys being collected in the Friendship Room earlier this year? Well, it is now time to get them ready for ACTION! Join us for a hands-on activity and powerful way to address homelessness. It's time to unlock housing equity!

Save the Dates

Central's Beacon members invite you to join them in the Dining Room after worship on June 11 in writing messages to the members of the Metropolitan Council and attaching them to the keys we collected. This event will run from about 11:45 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. and include light snacks and refreshments. You are welcome to stay as long as you like or leave when you must.

The Beacon congregational organizer for Central, Justin Lewandowski, will share information about the need for deeply affordable housing, especially in the suburbs, and the importance of the Met Council making project-based rent vouchers more accessible to

developers. After this short talk, we'll work together on tagging our keys to get them ready for delivery. Children are welcome too!

Everyone's tagged keys will then be combined with those from other Beacon congregations and presented to the Metropolitan Council by the Beacon Interfaith Housing Collaborative. This will happen on Wednesday, June 14 after a press conference on the front steps of Central and a short march over to the Met Council offices. It will be a dramatic way to publicly work to change policy. Stay tuned for further details.
