# THROUGH THE LENS OF HISTORY

On a Monday in mid-April, I had taken the day off to spend with friends. Our first stop was Minneopa State Park just outside Mankato, where we saw a herd of bison the state maintains in a large grassy enclosure in one part of the park. We then went to see the double waterfalls where we also discovered wildflowers in abundance.

Since we were in Mankato, I wanted to visit the site of the hanging of the 38 Dakota men in 1862. I grew up

in Minnesota and had studied the state's history in school. But we had learned history from the perspective of the white settlers. I do not recall learning about the largest public hanging in the United States that occurred in Mankato. It has only been in the last ten years that I have been studying the history of our state from the perspective of our indigenous brothers and sisters, a difficult history scarred by broken treaties and promises.

# ANTI-RACISM & BEACON GROUPS JOIN FORCES

The Anti-Racism Task Force (ARTF) and the Beacon Leadership Team have come together to look at racism in housing. Discussions between the members of both groups have spurred further interest in advocating for changes in housing policies. ARTF members Barb Swanson, Doug Throckmorton, Casey Wells and Leon Oman are part of the Beacon Leadership Team along with Maggie Gordon, Heidi Jernstedt and Lynne Two other Task Force Severson. members participated in March at the monthly statewide gathering for Beacon, "Rent is Due" – a short workshop leading to easy contact with state legislators.

Partnering with Central's Beacon Leadership around low-income affordable housing is a great fit. Anti -Racism and affordable housing are joined at the hip. We are excited about working together.

Our Task Force has read and discussed the book, How to be an Anti-Racist by the contemporary writer and educator Dr. Ibram Kendi. Dr. Kendi is now the Director of the Center for Antiracist Research at Boston University. One of the main takeaways of his book for us is his insistence on identifying and then actively working on specific policy changes.

A Beacon workshop on Racism and Housing reveals startling disparities in Minnesota.

The average Black family in the Twin Cities area earns less than  $\frac{1}{2}$  of the median white family income – an

inequality gap that is second in the nation only to Milwaukee.

Minnesota has a documented history of redlining that effectively keeps people of color out of mostly white neighborhoods. Discriminatory loans do the same. Consequences spill into next generations.

"The way to heal the soul of the nation is to pass policies that heal the body of the nation. It's the just thing to do. That's how we as a nation can together move forward."

The ARTF urges members of Central Presbyterian Church to join with the Beacon Leadership Team in advocating for affordable housing – like creating a program for rent subsidies and increasing funding for housing bonds - and to be antiracists on other policy issues to be addressed in upcoming months.

## AN ARTISTIC VIEW [ CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1 ]

Reconciliation Park is a small park on the edge of downtown Mankato. Approaching it, you first see a statue of a bison. There is also a large scroll with the names of the 38 men who were executed there in 1862.

We visited Mankato the day after the death of Daunte Wright, an unarmed young black man killed at a traffic stop in Brooklyn Center. As I stood reading the names of the 38 Dakota men who had died at that place, I was aware of the juxtaposition of these two events. All these years later, we live in a state where racial injustice still scars the lives of individuals, families, and so many communities.

It is hard to know how to respond to this latest tragic event. I know we need to continue examining and confronting the root cause of the racial injustices. I know we need to continue praying and working together. There are no easy answers, nor quick solutions.

The last stop my friends and I made that day was to view the Silo Art Project. A short distance from Reconciliation Park, 135-foot-tall grain silos are covered with murals.



An artist from Melbourne, Australia spent nearly a year painting the mural. The artist decided on the image after visiting the Mahkato Wacipi, a pow wow honoring the 38 Dakota men executed in Mankato. At the pow wow the artist saw an Indigenous girl teaching a group of middle-school children a dance, an image that is depicted on the mural. In the midst of uncertainty about how to respond, the mural's image served to remind me that in acknowledging our past

we are working towards a future where we truly come together.

God, led us, that we may stand firm in faith for justice.

Teach us love. Teach us compassion.


Above all, out of love and compassion, teach us to act.



# THE CONTINUED SEARCH FOR A PASTOR

This article lays out in big picture terms the steps to hire a permanent pastor. This process typically takes 12 to 18 months and was developed to give maximum opportunity for involvement. It also has shown to give maximum likelihood for a successful hiring of a new pastor.

The major steps are:

- Complete a "Ministry Study" and gain Presbytery approval,
- Elect a Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC),
- PNC prepares a Ministry Information Form,
- PNC reviews candidate Personal Information Forms (resumes),
- PNC selects and nominates a candidate,
- Presbytery, Congregation and Minister accept the call.

Two of the above steps, the Ministry Study and the PNC, warrant more detailed discussion.

# Our First Step

The purpose of the Ministry Study is to capture the essence of who Central has been, who we are today, and what we want to be. The reason for capturing this is such that the PNC can write a Ministry Information Form that reflects ourselves to a prospective candidate. Then, when candidates submit a Personal Information Form, the PNC can assess accurately whether the prospective candidate meets

Central's needs. The methods by which we prepare the Ministry Study are currently under evaluation by Session but will include as many voices as wish to be heard. It is likely that some activities may be able to be done in-person but others will use remote technology. We will share details of how to get involved and progress in future newsletters. The Ministry Study will build on the "Rebranding Study" completed in 2018; however, it may need to go further and be updated for all the changes in the church and the community that have occurred since then. One final comment on the study. Such a study is often called a mission study but we believe Ministry Study is a better descriptor of the expected product.

# **Understanding the PNC**

You may have noticed the key steps for finding and selecting a candidate are performed by the Pastor Nominating Committee. The PNC cannot be formed until the Presbytery approves the Ministry Study. This is not only a reflection of the importance of the study but is an essential element in selecting the members of the PNC. The PNC will be selected to represent this congregation not only in the traditional areas of diversity but also in the diversity of desires and goals for the future of Central. Only in that context can the PNC select the right minister for Central. Being a member of the PNC is an arduous but fulfilling task. It involves reviewing documents, listening to sermons, and deliberating with

other PNC members; all the while seeking God's guidance to find the best person for Central. During the PNC deliberations Pastor Reed will not be allowed to intervene but we will have a Presbytery advisor assigned.

# **End-of-Year Music Party**


Here's the bad news: I'm not sure when it will be yet.

# **VOCALPOINT NEWS**

VocalPoint is planning to hold our 11th Season this winter! And, we hope it will be a real (not virtual) one! We know that things are changing on a weekly basis and so we continue to follow the science and the guidelines of the CDC, but we are planning on choosing a beneficiary organization and to support their work in our winter concert. The concert itself may or may not look exactly like past years, but in some ways this is true for all of our concerts: they are each unique and responsive to current events.

Curious what we look for in a partner organization? Here are our requirements:

Organization is reviewed via a reputable monitoring organization, such as Guide Star, Charity Navigator and/or the Minnesota Charities Review Council.

Organization does work that can be measured in tangible or concrete ways.

Size of the Organization: We want the amount that we raise to make a difference for the organization. Huge organizations aren't a great fit for us; we like to support the underdogs! However, we do need the organization to have capacity to meet our collaborative needs.

**Nondiscriminatory**: If there is a religious connection, it must be interfaith.

Marketability: How do we sell this idea and this organization to those who are not "in the know"? Can we tell a powerful story in 120 minutes? Can we articulate to others the importance of what this group is doing?

Musicality: VocalPoint strives to put together a concert that is interesting

and diverse yet accessible. Is there a global connection with the music, or a cultural one? Does the music lend itself to a concert of 120 minutes? Are there guests we can invite to help tell this story?

Location: While the non-profit does not need to be local, we do want there to be a local connection. Are there supporters in the Metro area or is there a way to connect with our community? Also, if it's not a local organization, it must provide a service that is unique. For example, we would not choose to support a food shelf in Ohio; there are food shelves here that we would instead support.

## Did You Know?

550,000 Minnesotans – too many of them children – live in households struggling every single month to pay their rent. In addition, people of color are disproportionately affected by the rent affordability crisis.

One financial crisis – a hospital visit or the car breaking down – could tip them over the edge and into eviction. Families are barely hanging on. This instability of home is a crisis for our state. It is a moral issue.

As a member of Beacon Interfaith Housing Collaborative, Central is joining forces with over 100 other



Twin City area congregations in pressing our MN state legislators to solve this housing crisis. Beacon's solution is rent subsidies for all low-income renters so no one pays more than 30% of their income on housing.

This is a bold initiative that requires increasing support from legislators - and they are signing on!! But we need to keep showing them that we won't let up insisting this is the right thing to do to solve our housing crisis.

Please support Central's Beacon work by participating in upcoming

30 minute "Rent is Due" events on the first of the each month. The goal is to show our legislators that an increasing number of people of faith support a home for all.

- Saturday, November 13th.




