## PASTOR NOMINATING COMMITTEE BEGINS

making direct phone calls to people of all ages, including long-term members as well as newer members, people with children and those without children, people who came to Central from Dayton Avenue Presbyterian Church and those who are legacy members of Central. While not everyone was able to serve in this way or at this time, we are grateful for those who stepped forward to do the work of the PNC in the months to come.



## FINANCE COMMITTEE UPDATE

Thanks to generous giving by members, Central's finances are in positive territory for the year-to-date. Central has also been capturing more of its per capita payment than in past years. This per capita amount is money that all Presbyterian churches owe to the

denomination. It is calculated based on church membership. When members cover Central's per capita allotment with dedicated gifts, it frees up money elsewhere in the church budget that can be used for worship, musical programming, and other key needs. This year the per capita fee is \$36.50 per member.

The Finance Committee would also like to thank members who have reliably contributed to the Zopfi Building Improvement Fund in recent months. Those contributions recently enabled the church to replace a kitchen freezer — a much needed upgrade as our Wednesday lunch program came back on line.

### BRICK BY BRICK FUNDRAISER

As shown so well in the April newsletter, the restoration work on the front of our historic building has made a very notable difference in both its condition and appearance. Thanks to member Fluryanne Leach, we've been able to obtain Minnesota Historical Society Legacy grants to help with that restoration and the limestone foundation this year.



We have three more sides of our building in need of restoration. The back (east) side is next. As you can imagine, costs increase each year and the building's condition worsens. We will continue to apply for grant funding, and providing matching funds is important for making our grant application more attractive.

To increase the matching fund amount needed for a grant to repair/ replace the masonry on the back of



the building (east side), our immediate need and goal is to raise \$30,000 by July 14.

Bricks may not be high on your list of most beautiful church building features, but our bricks need a lot of love! Most of the bricks on the east side require replacing 100% of the repointing and a number of areas will need 50% of the them replaced.

### A SIGN OF SPRING

The wilderness and the dry land shall be glad, the desert shall rejoice and blossom; like the crocus it shall blossom abundantly and rejoice with joy and singing.

- Isaiah 35:1-2

The weeks that follow Easter are called the Season of Easter in the church. It reminds us that Easter is not just a day. Actually, each Sunday morning is called a "Little Easter" – emphasizing that we are an Easter people who proclaim the message of the resurrection with our very lives.

Easter falls on the calendar differently every year, actually determined by the first Sunday following the first full moon after the vernal equinox. The formula is not important but it means Easter can come some years in Minnesota when the snow is still very much on the ground and some years when springtime is in full bloom.

This year we have had many false starts to spring as winter just did not seem ready to let go. The weekend of Palm Sunday, I went out to the Landscape Arboretum in Chaska for a walk. It was still cold enough many nights so that the sap was still running in the maple trees that were still being tapped on the grounds. However, despite the cold temperatures, there was enough sunshine that the earliest spring flowers – the crocus and snowdrops – were showing off their spring colors.

Whatever the date, Easter always is a visual reminder of new life. My prayer is that during this Easter season you too will be able to feel

blessed by the world our God created.

God bless to us each sign of spring, each new green shoot, each lighter day, each warmer wind. God bless to us rebirth.


## Opportunities for Children in Worship











## REFLECTIONS FROM EASTER SUNDAY




