We are on the cusp of an exciting new time at Central!

We have been preparing for this moment for a long time; some would say fifteen years of hard work has brought us to this point. Like someone preparing for her first hang gliding experiencing, we have been preparing. Some have such a fear of heights that they remain earthbound, unable to take risks. But those who wish to see, to soar, to fly, must climb to the top and walk to the edge. They will double check safety gear, take a deep breath, and launch.

And we believe that the hard work in recent years, combined with steady stewardship of generosity, has put us in a unique position.

We have stabilized our endowment after receiving a large financial gift a few years ago. Instead of socking that money away for a rainy day, we prayed and dreamed and wondered what God wanted from us. We set goals and priorities, we made decisions about where to invest in new staff and enhanced hours from current staff. Previous generosity, combined with investing in our mission and ministry capacity, have brought us this opportunity to soar.

November 10 is a day to celebrate the work we have been doing together and give thanks for we know it is Time to Soar! On this Stewardship Sunday, we will hear and see how Central has been preparing for this very moment, and the opportunities we have before us. It is a day to dedicate gifts and pledges and also a day to dedicate people.

Music will feature a new anthem by our composer-in-residence Abbie Betinis, sung by the Central Choir.

CHILD CARE








PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN FALL GATHERING

On October 12, twelve women from Central drove to Kasson, MN for the Fall Gathering of the Presbyterian Women of the Twin Cities Presbytery. These gatherings happen twice each year and are an opportunity to learn about topics of importance to Presbyterian Women's related to our emphasis on mission, justice and peace. Women from across the Presbytery come together to learn and share fellowship with one another at these gatherings.

This fall's gathering began a broader discussion on topic of immigration, which is a highly emotional and heart-wrenching topic. It is also complex, with many agencies having involvement in the process, making it difficult to sort out all of the pieces. We heard from a speaker who works in Immigration and Customs Enforcement, who gave us

information on their role and responsibility. In addition, we heard firsthand from a gentleman who spent time providing aid at the southern border recently. We also shared a worship service, lunch and then time in small groups discussing how we can be helpful to people in need and impact change. offering that was collected was to support the work of Angry Tias and Abuelas of the Rio Grande Valley, a group founded by 8 women whose mission is to provide basic necessities for health and safety, and support for human dignity and justice, to individuals and families seeking asylum at our borders, and as they embark on their journeys to designated destinations in the US. Some may be familiar with Paula Sanders, a Presbyterian Minister from our Presbytery. Paula has

recently relocated to the McAllen, TX area to join this ministry.

As PW-PTCA women, we want to learn about how we can support people in need through humanitarian efforts in a very challenging environment. Conversation and learning about how we can be more impactful will continue at the Spring 2020 Gathering, which will be held at Central on April 25, 2020.

At the Fall Gathering, we had the opportunity to talk with women from across the Presbytery, who are doing good work in our communities and our world, supporting justice, peace and humanitarian efforts. We rekindled relationships and developed new ones.

It was an inspiring day.

THANK OFFERING [NOVEMBER 17]

During the 3rd Sunday Lunch in November, you will have an opportunity to contribute to the Presbyterian Women's Thank Offering. This offering began in 1888, and provides financial assistance to mission projects regionally, nationally and around the world. Presbyterian Women USA manage the offering so that 100% of your donations go directly to the projects.

To be considered for a Thank Offering grant, projects must have a clearly defined purpose that meets basic human needs and be a creative project less than three years old, or an existing project moving in a new direction. The Thank Offering bylaws require that 40% of the projects that receive grants are related to health ministries.

Grants provide access to food and water, alleviate homelessness, provide educational opportunities, promote health, and improve the lives of women, children and men throughout the world. In 2019—thanks to your generous giving in 2018 - 18 projects (12 national and

6 international) received grants.

As of the printing of this newsletter, there are still many volunteer spots to be filled, especially for overnight hosts. We are hoping as you read this, you will feel that sense of urgency to step up and serve our community in this important way.

During the month of November, Central will serve as a homeless shelter for 20 people, offering meals, hospitality, and compassion. To make this happen, we rely on volunteers to serve as hosts each night during this month-long program.

OVERNIGHT HOSTS STILL MANY SPOTS TO FILL!

This is an easy position to fill with the work-shift from 8:00 p.m. to 7:30 a.m. (weekdays) or 9:30 a.m. (weekends). Overnight hosts assist to ensure everyone is settled for the night, then sleep in a separate room

where beds are provided. In the morning, overnight hosts put out a simple breakfast (plus clean it up) and assist the Project Home staffers in seeing families off for school, work, or other activities. Your presence is to answer any questions that may come up during the night. However, most families will be with Central for the entire month and will know the routine.

MOVE-IN & MOVE-OUT SHIFTS Work alongside staff members from Central and Project Home to do some behind-the-scenes work necessary for making Central a welcoming space for families to spend the night. Shifts are Friday, November 1 (9:00 a.m.), and Monday, December 2 (7:30 a.m.) and last about 2 hours.

EVENING HOSTS SHIFTS STILL AVAILABLE!

The work-shift is from 5:30 - 8:30 p.m. The evening hosts meet up with Project Home staff members to



welcome and assist our guests, read and play with children, converse with parents, and serve snacks.


FUN AND GAMES
