While driving into the church on the day I was to write this newsletter article about stewardship, I heard Minnesota Public Radio announcers talk about their fall member drive. The MPR announcer said, "You can listen for free, but if there are benefits you receive from our quality programming, your giving helps ensure the programming you enjoy will continue into the future".

Stewardship happens in churches every fall where we too talk about the need for giving to support the budget, to pay the bills and to support the church's mission. You may give to the special building funds at Central realizing that this beautiful historic building would never be built again and it is a mission to keep it in good repair for generations to come. General giving pays staff salaries, which in turn allows programs and missions to continue. This year, a new growth area is the children's and youth



programs. It is not a big expense on the budget, but it does take resources.

However, stewardship is more than just talking about the budget. The Bible defines a steward as someone who cares for the world and all God created. Practicing stewardship is more than deciding what dollar amount to give the church. Stewardship imitates God's example of abundance and sharing; it is a spiritual practice – a part of living as a disciple of Jesus Christ.

This year the stewardship season at Central is focusing on how we are **Growing in Faith** – both as individuals and as a congregation. Scripture uses the image of seeds being planted to remind us that God's word has been planted in our lives and in our community. Through the spiritual practice of stewardship, we participate in nurturing faith to help it grow.

Stewardship Dedication Sunday is November 13. In the coming weeks in worship, we will hear from church members about why the church needs funds and why they have chosen to give. A stewardship letter and a pledge card will be coming in the mail which can be returned on November 13, dropped in the offering plate, or mailed to the church office.

Blessings to you as you continue to grow in faith at Central.

Central has been learning about and addressing the issues of hunger and homelessness locally in several ways... as a member of Beacon Interfaith Housing Collaborative, volunteering and donating clothing for Project Home and the Department of Indian Works, food drives for Keystone Community Services, participating in Bread for the World's Offering of Letters, and serving meals at Catholic Charities' Opportunity Center regularly over the past few years. All of these worthy organizations, along with others for many members, report increased need for our time and donations. Worship will explore these themes further.

Financial Update

FROM MATT EHLING, TREASURER

Thanks to generous and sustained giving by its members, as well as solid expense management by staff, Central's finances have been stable and predictable year-to-date. At the end of September, total revenue for the year was \$399,977, with total expenses of \$391,935.

Increased pledging at the end of last year helped us to eliminate a projected 2022 deficit, and to instead remain financially stable into 2022, even in the face of increases in utility prices and other necessary expenses.

The session is now in the process of constructing the 2023 budget, and evaluating how to deal with the continued cost increases in certain areas, along with a slight projected reduction in earned income from Central's investments, due to challenging financial market conditions this year. Pledges for the coming year will help in the budgeting process. (See below)

Much of the finance committee's work this year has involved finalizing a five-year financial plan

to address things like future capital needs for the church; ways to boost rental income from building use (such as from musical groups or potentially another congregation); long-term bequest giving; and future staffing costs.



Thank Offering

During November 20 worship, we will have opportunity to learn more about the Presbyterian Women's Thank Offering. This offering has a long history in the Presbyterian Church, dating back to 1888 when women gave a little extra to support the Women's General Missionary Society of the United Presbyterian Church of North America.

This offering focuses on financial assistance to mission projects locally and around the world - funding programs that provide health care



support, safe housing, disaster recovery, and more. To qualify for a grant, projects must have a clearly defined purpose that meets basic human needs and be a project less than three years old, or an existing project moving in a new direction.

Presbyterian Women USA manage the offering so that 100% of your donations go directly to the projects. Funds donated in 2022 will support projects in 2023. Through your generosity, ten projects received grants in 2022, eight of which were in the United States and two were international. As always, over 40% of the projects are related to health ministries.

There are several ways you can donate to the Thank Offering. You may donate by check (payable to Women of Central) and drop in the offering plate, or donate online at www.centralforgood.org/give,

choosing 'Special Offering' fund and 'Thank Offering' in the memo. We will have baskets to collect donations during the Third Sunday Lunch on November 20h and checks may be sent to the church office (500 Cedar Street, St. Paul, MN 55101). Thank you, in advance, for your support of the Thank Offering.

Handbell News

Do you know why handbell players often wear gloves?

Some techniques require you to touch the bells (to stop the sound in certain ways) and the oils from our hands can damage the bells. So, we wear gloves! And, occasionally, we need to polish the bells to remove anything that could cause harm to the bells



over time. Our handbell ensemble polished up the bells a few weeks ago and the bells look great!

Interested in learning more and perhaps joining us?

We could use a few new ringers! People often ask me if you need to be able to read music to play the bells. Yes, at some level you do but I think people might think that means fancier things than it really does. Typically, and most often in our bell ensemble, you are assigned 2, 3 or sometimes 4 bells for the entire song. So, you need to be able to recognize when those 2, 3 or maybe 4 bells ring. In other words, you do not need to be able to play every note – just the few that are assigned to you. You do need to have some sense of counting to be able to play the bells at the right

time. If you know how beats work in a measure, and you have some general comfort with how music is written out, you should give ringing a try!

Talk to Jennifer Anderson if you are interested in learning more, or if you'd like to give bells a trial run!

New Plotform for Giving

Recently, Central unveiled its new options for giving, including text-togive options! This change is available because Central has moved its online giving platform from Paypal to Abundant. Abundant is an online payment processor, uniquely designed to meet the needs of churches. It provides improved reporting and accounting system integration, as well as new features for how members can donate.

As it has always been, you can access online giving on our website at www.centralforgood.org/give. All options are outlined there. When you click donate, you will have the ability to choose which fund you are donating to, as well as set up an account to save your payment methods and see records of your giving (if you so desire).

The advantage of this system is that in addition to donation via credit or debit card you can give through bank transfers and recurring giving.

If you have recurring giving already in place in PayPal, we ask that you change your giving to this new system before the end of 2022.
