

In 1997, Fred Rogers accepted an Emmy Award for Lifetime
Achievement. In his acceptance speech, famously recounted by Tom Junod article in Esquire the following year, Mr. Rogers had these words to say: "All of us have special ones who have loved us into being. Would you just take, along with me, ten seconds to think of the people who have helped you become who you are. Those who have cared about you and wanted what was best for you in life. Ten seconds of silence. I'll watch the time."

The camera panned as daytime celebrities moved from awkward laughter to tears, confronted with the simple and incredible power of those relationships which Christians call the cloud of witness – those through whom we have come to the present.

On November 5th, we will remember at Central those witnesses – those

saints – who have died in the past year. People who have been our friends, family, guides, mentors, confidants, companions, and more. Those who have "loved us into being." We will do this for the same reason Mr. Rogers asked us those years ago. We are who we are through other people, and by remembering them and honoring their memories, we honor God who created and loved both them and us, making us for fellowship with one another.

If there are those who you are remembering as part of the extended family of Central, please let us know by November 1. It will be our honor to share their name in worship, folded into the great cloud of witness to which we all belong.

We'll watch the time.

# Anti-Racism Task Force Offerings This Program Year

The Anti-Racism Task Force is joining Pastor Chris this year to support and expand his Faith Formation First Sunday classes. We will do this in two ways: we will provide Zoom access to his classes on first Sundays. Then, later in the month, beginning in November we will invite you to an event highlighting the intersection between his main topic and antiracism work. Each month will be a little different in timing and venue, depending on the topic. Activities range from a one-time book discussion to a six-week Lenten study, and from a movement toward legislation to a field trip to a Mosque.

To participate in an extension activity, watch for sign-up information in the newsletter or bulletin, or just show up when applicable!

### November: Health Care

There will be a book discussion November 16, 7:00 on Zoom. The One Book One Minnesota read for this year is *In the Night of Memory*, by Native American author and professor Linda LeGarde Grover. The novel begins with Loretta's surrender of her young daughters Azure and Rain to the court system before Loretta becomes another in a long line of missing Native women. At first glance, the book might not seem to be about health care at all. Maternal health, alcoholism, and generational and personal trauma are all health issues, however, and they all show up in the pages of this text. The book can be difficult to get right now, so please let Anna Sanchez know right away if you would like her to get one for you. The cost is \$15.

Read the book, then join Avis Tilden and other members of the ARTF for a discussion on Zoom on Thursday, November 16 at 7 p.m. Reserve a spot (and ensure that you get the link!) by emailing the office.

### December: Criminal Justice

Join in an ARTF Conversation with Downtown Neighbors, December 17, 11:45 a.m. in the dining room, in-person only.

In a world where relationships tend to be transactions rather than human interactions and worth is judged by possession of resources and expertise rather than simple human value, it's no mystery that both church and community resort to prejudice and injustice. During Advent, ARTF is inviting young adult guests (mostly African American) from the downtown area to talk with us about their experiences. We will ask them how they experience law enforcement, where they experience general prejudice in the

neighborhood, and how they see the church in light of their experiences. We hope that learning will eventually turn to partnership and improvement.

Join Beverly Bodom, other ARTF members, and special guests for lunch and conversation on December 17 following worship if you want to listen in!

## January: Economic Rights

We will gather Sunday January 22, 11:45 in the upstairs Meeting Lounge. A Zoom hybrid option will be provided.

Acquiring and maintaining wealth becomes a racial issue when inheritance is interrupted, through unlawful seizure of lands, loss of property during refugee resettlement, disparity in compensation for land involved in eminent domain, or other circumstances that cause families of color to move.

Hear about one remedy for one such disruption as Leon Oman and other ARTF members share and discuss information about a movement to offer reparation to Indigenous Peoples in Minnesota through a small fee when land is bought and sold.

There are plans outlined for the remaining monthly topics outlined with the Adult Faith Formation series. Stay tuned to future newsletters for those details!

On Sunday, November 19 we will have an opportunity to learn more about the Presbyterian Women's Thank Offering. This offering focuses on financial assistance to mission projects locally and around the world. We help fund programs that provide health care support, safe housing, recovery from disaster and more. Over 40% of the projects are related to health ministries.

Presbyterian Women USA manage the offering so that 100% of your donations go directly to the projects. Funds donated in 2023 will support projects in 2024. Through your generosity, seven projects received grants in 2023. These projects range from providing support for people experiencing homelessness following natural disaster, resources to grow food to help address food insecurity, providing access to mental health needs of LQBTQIA+ youth and building a health center

in rural Zambia for women to improve maternal health.

# Central's Landscape Improvement Project

Because many of us enter the church from the parking lot, we don't often see the front landscape. But our passersby in the neighborhood see the front façade, and the grounds were needing some TLC.

So a small team has been working to improve this area: we developed a plan to remove old shrubs and plant the southwest area with native perennials that are drought tolerant. Thanks to Mark Flinner and Scott Klaehn for removing dead shrubs and stumps and to Mark, Aiden, Jane Lonergan and others for clearing weeds from the area.

Recently we divided day lilies from the northwest garden and relocated them to the southwest. And, we transplanted the ajuga, that was planted and tended for many years by Avis Tilden, Laura Henry, and Casey Wells, to surround the transplanted lilies. We also planted grasses, joe pye weed, allium, iris, echinacea and rudbeckia from our home gardens. Then, the plantings were surrounded by mulch from a local compost site. Thank you to all who have participated thus far. We need help as we go through the fall and into the spring to be sure our plants get enough water, and in the spring with adding more plants to the area.

It was heartwarming to hear the many comments from passersby as we worked on a cool and windy day. They were happy to see the grounds being tended, further evidence to our neighbors that Central is in the city for good!

# Adult Faith Formation

### NOVEMBER TOPIC: HEALTH CARE

Health care is a critical issue for human rights. This is true for issues that dominate contemporary political discourse - take access to genderaffirming care - as well as broader issues like who gets access to health care, and how health care contributes to a thriving life.

As readers of the Bible, we believe, or at least suspect, that God has something to say to us about a good and thriving life for all through the words of Scripture. And yet it's difficult to know how to be in conversation about modern issues with a document written in the

ancient near east with vastly different assumptions and access to basic knowledge (the germ theory of disease wasn't widely accepted until just over 150 years ago!).

On November 5 at 11:45 a.m., we'll have some of that conversation. We'll identify the ways in which access to health care is part of a thriving life, how we can be responsible readers of the Bible as we look for God's intentions for the good of all, and how we might act in the world in response to that intersection. Join us, bring an open mind, and bring your questions.
