Finding Strength in Unexpected Ways

In England, you may come across a “wavy” brick fence. Apart from being more aesthetically pleasing, I have read that a wavy fence uses less bricks than a straight one. A straight fence is not sturdy enough to stand strong unless it is the thickness of at least two layers of bricks. Straight brick fences are often reinforced as well with posts to support them. However, a wavy one-brick fence stands fine on its own due to the arch support provided by its wavy shape. Plus, there is an added benefit of how interesting it looks!

This idea of the strength of a wavy fence is not only interesting, it feels like a metaphor for life. We all know things get complicated and we can feel like the pathway ahead seems uncertain. Things happen unexpectedly, someone gets sick or loses a job, a relationship changes or ends, someone moves away, expectations are unmet, we find ourselves in a place we had not

expected. Yet there is strength where we might not expect it, especially when we remind ourselves we do not handle these challenges alone.

We come to church for all kinds of reasons: to worship God, to be grounded in faith, to be with people who are also trying to live as disciples of Jesus Christ. It is good to remind ourselves that we are not alone when life takes unexpected turns, when we are unable to anticipate the future. Another reason we come to church is to be reminded we are loved and cared for by God, and when we get off course, to find our pathway leading back to God.

We know there will be changes ahead at Central. The PNC is moving forward on their search for a permanent pastor. The children and youth programs have had a new infusion of energy and creativity and look forward to a year



of growth and fun. There are new musicians leading with Jennifer and the choirs in worship. A mission program of the church for many years, Martha’s Closet, is being redesigned to meet the current needs of the community.

Change is always coming at us, but we can be like that wavy fence and be grounded and strong knowing the Spirit of God is walking with us, giving us the strength for whatever is ahead. Blessings to all in this new program year!

Rod Kelly Hines is a classically trained baritone and versatile artist who enjoys performing in a variety of genres. He feels most at home in choral ensembles, enjoying the spectrum of artistry that he is able to explore within a vast range of musical styles.

From 2018-2021 he was a member of the Brooklyn-based ensemble Choral Chameleon, under the direction of Vince Peterson. In 2019 he became an inaugural member of



Exigence Vocal Ensemble, directed by Dr. Eugene Rogers.

He received a Master of Music in Voice Performance from Georgia State University in Atlanta, GA, where he performed roles: Masetto in *Don Giovanni* (Mozart), Papageno in *Die Zauberflöte* (Mozart), and Peter in *Hansel & Gretel* (Humperdinck). He was also a featured soloist in the opera *Silent Night* by Kevin Puts, presented by The Atlanta Opera in their 2017-18 season.

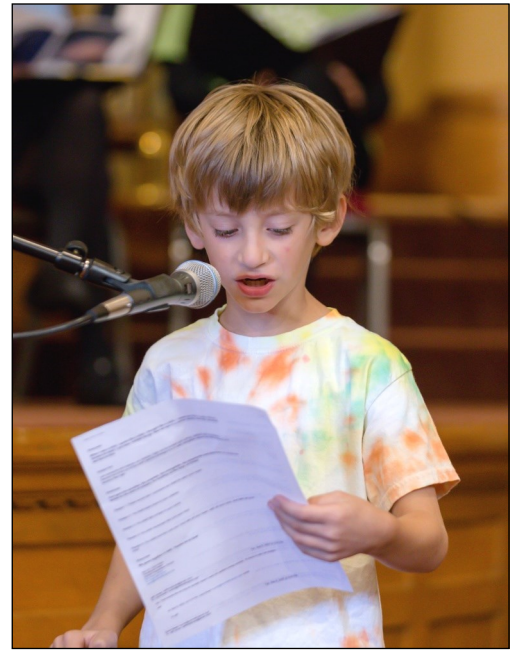

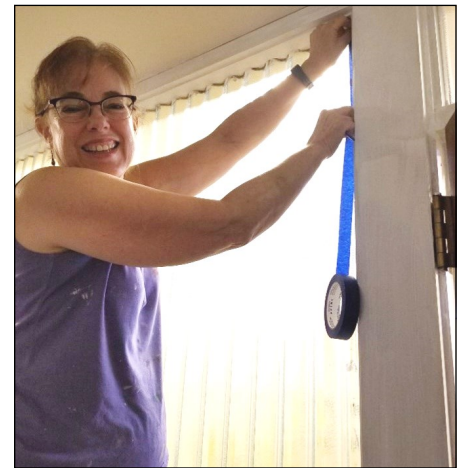

NURSERY

One of the most beautiful rooms in the church, this space is specifically designed for our babies and toddlers. There are toys and blankets, blocks, and baby dolls. There is a changing area and a bathroom sized just right for the newly potty-trained. This room is filled with light from windows that overlook Downtown and is full of love from the staff and volunteers that care for the children.



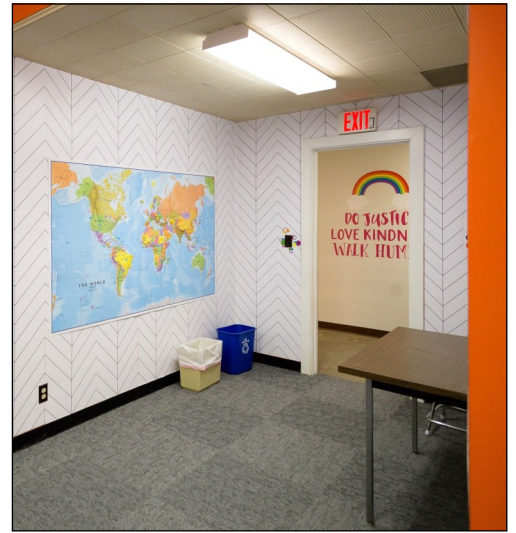
PRESCHOOL ROOM

This space is connected to the nursery, so the toys and play spaces are shared with all of our youngest Centralites. It also has a little “play house” that is becoming a favorite space to play, and small tables with chairs for art projects and games.



CHRISTIAN EDUCATION OFFICE

This space is just for the adult staff and volunteers. A work space - complete with coffee maker for those early Sunday mornings – to gather supplies, prepare projects, and check in. We have lockers in the hallway to keep our personal belongings safe and secure, as well as a computer and printer for any last minute lesson plan needs.



ORANGE ROOM

One of two classrooms for our elementary age kids, this space has a stage for quick skits and silly improv, a piano, and kid-size table and chairs. Continued use shows there are lots of good ways to utilize this room!



AGAPE ROOM

“Agape” is unconditional love... the love of God for us, and the love that we are asked to give back to God and to our neighbors. It is a selfless love talked about in the Bible many times. This is our second room for elementary kids, and you will know you are in the Agape Room by all the hearts that remind us to share love with everyone we meet!



YOUTH ROOM

This space is all about hanging out and being together! It's a space with couches and comfy chairs, cool lighting, and lots of treats.

This room is used for our Middle School “Life Boats” and High School “Compass” gatherings, plus special youth activities throughout the year. Stop on by for some fresh popcorn and a cup of hot cocoa.

GALILEE ROOM

This room is big with tall ceilings – perfect to play with the parachute, play a game of badminton, or do a big circle game with lots of children! The walls have murals of things we might see in Galilee: A boat on the sea of Galilee (complete with net and fish); a hill that Jesus may have climbed to teach the Sermon on the Mount, or perhaps when the boy shared his fish and bread; sheep in the pasture who are being tended by a shepherd; an olive tree (perhaps in the Garden of Gethsemane?); a cave that could be an empty tomb on Easter morning; a well filled with water; and a street with houses and even the Galilee Market, complete with a camel taking a nap under a palm tree. 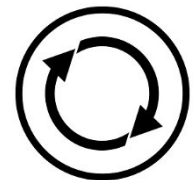

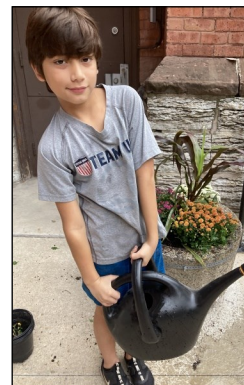

Special Peace Offering on October 2

On October 2, Central will share in World Communion Sunday and worship will feature an invitation for us to participate in a special offering with the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A).

The Peace & Global Witness Offering enables the church to promote the peace of Christ by addressing systems of injustice across the world. This special offering is about empowering congregations and individuals to become peacemakers themselves. The offering funds ministries of peace, reconciliation, and advocacy for peace and justice in cultures of violence, including our own, through collaborative projects of education and Christian witness.

Because the Peace & Global Witness Offering is a shared offering, we are able, as a single congregation, to participate in this larger work that we would not be able to do on our own. Twenty-five percent of the offering will stay with our own congregation to help with peacemaking efforts; last

year it was earmarked to help with refugee resettlement work in Minnesota. Part of the offering goes to support the Presbytery's work on peacemaking and anti-racism, and 50% will be used at the national level for ministries of peacemaking and global witness. Remember - peace is active, not passive.

Peace is doing, not waiting.

Because contributions are divided between local, regional, and national efforts, gifts are most helpful if you put cash or a check in the offering plate. (Mark pew envelope clearly with *Peace and Global Witness*). You give online at www.centralforgood.org/give and note 'Special offering' in note field. Mailed checks are also welcome.
