THE POPULAR QUESTION AT HAND

Where are we at in the search process for a new called pastor?

Calling a pastor is considered a 3-part relationship: between a congregation, a pastor, and the Presbytery. (Did you know that in the Presbyterian Church (USA) clergy are actually members of a Presbytery rather than a local congregation and accountable to the Presbytery?) In the search for a permanent called pastor, a liaison has been assigned to Central from the Presbytery to assist in the search process.

Throughout spring and summer there were listening sessions for the congregation to share what they feel makes Central unique as well as hopes and dreams for Central in the future. The idea is we need to

determine how the congregation understands itself before knowing what to look for in the next pastor. Members and friends were invited to join a number of in-person or meetings on Zoom to share thoughts about what makes. If you were unable to participate and still want your voice heard, please contact Rev. Carol Reed (carolr@centralforgood.org) and a meeting or phone conversation can still be arranged.

The Next Step

With the results of these listening sessions in hand, the next step will be to compile results that reflect Central's strength, values, and hopes for the future. Please speak to Rev. Reed if you would like to help with what should be interesting work. A ministry study will be creating which will be submitted to

the Presbytery for review. We will then be able to elect a Pastor Nominating Committee. That ministry study will inform the job description for our permanent pastor.

It has been many years since Central Presbyterian Church did a search for a called pastor. (Rev. Dave Colby came to Central as a designated pastor, a much different process.) The Presbytery does not intend to mystify us with the process, but wants to help us find the best candidate for the church. Following is a simple graphic to illustrate the steps we will undergo.

WELCOME NEW ARTIST EXHIBITION



For the months of September and October, Mankato artist William Bukowski will be showing landscapes in our fellowship gallery.

Bukowski is Professor Emeritus from Bethany Lutheran College where he taught art for 40 years. The artwork he will be showing is primarily pleinair landscapes of Minnesota but he is a versatile artist. William has done commissioned paintings for Minneapolis and St. Paul Children's Hospitals as well as Abbott Northwesten Hospital. He has also done commission work for churches including an altarpiece on the campus of Bethany in Mankato and a series on the life of Christ for Trinity Lutheran Church in Waterville, Minnesota.

He could be described as a realist or figurative painter in the old European tradition and yet influenced by modern life. "I have always felt that the job of the artist was to see: things





and places and people and try convey what is interesting, compelling or unique about the visual matter. The idea in my painting is to achieve a perceptual experience. I also try to create interesting surfaces.



I like to show paint as paint. With commissions every thing is different because of the built in audience and the demands of the patron. I am able to work with those conditions and as an artist it is very gratifying to have artwork that enhances the space of a hospital or church for many people for years to come."

A LOOK AT CENTRAL FINANCES

A Unique Year

Financially, Central Presbyterian Church has weathered the pandemic rather well so far and we are grateful to everyone who has helped us towards this accomplishment. Over the summer we've been a little further behind on giving than usual. If you are able to catch up on your pledge at this time it would be greatly appreciated.

Building Restoration

The church treasurer works closely with Central's investment advisors at RBC Wealth Management, advising and making recommendations to the Finance & Stewardship Committee related to Central's monthly and long -range financial requirements.

Thanks to Flurryanne Leach's dedication to the restoration of the church's exterior, we have approved matching funds for a grant application for some foundation work that, if approved, could be completed next year.

Going forward, a capital campaign will be necessary to fund significant projects that remain. The Finance & Stewardship Committee has had ongoing discussions about the timing of this. Though a campaign is unlikely to begin this year, we have set up a reserved account for building restoration. If you find yourself in a position to contribute funds to this project at this time, please know that they are welcome and will be reserved for this

important work.

As we approach fall we are making plans for our stewardship drive. Watch for more in the coming weeks!

Committee Membership

Current members of the Finance & Stewardship Committee are Phyllis Brashler, Matt Ehling, Craig Foss, Cindy Jessen, Barb Swanson, Carl Willis, and Chris Smith (chair). Rev. Dr. Carol Reed and Anna Sanchez, church administrator, also contribute.

For now we are still meeting via Zoom, at 6:30 on the 2nd Thursday of the month. While not the perfect way to gather, we did get to have a few members coax their cats to make an appearance in honor of the Cat Video Festival in St. Paul in August. If you have input or are interested in serving on our committee, please contact the church office. We'd love to hear from you!

Money Management

Now we will pass the baton to Matt for an overview of Central's financial picture which includes three different pools of money:

CONTRIBUTIONS

Central's annual operating expenses (including the bulk of staff salaries) are largely paid by member contributions. Central relies on these contributions to keep the church operating, without having to use investment principal.

LONG TERM INVESTMENTS

For many years, Central did not have enough member contributions to pay its annual expenses in full, and had to "fill the gap" between contributions and expenses by using principal from its investment funds. However, this was not sustainable over the long term, as the investment principal would eventually run out.

Due to a significant financial gift that re-capitalized its investments, the church has only drawn income - and not principal - from its long-term investments since 2018. These investments include the Endowment, Operating, and Mission accounts. The Operating and Endowment accounts generate supplemental operating income that the church uses to cover its expenses during the summer months, when church attendance - and giving - is down. The Mission account generates income that is used to fund scholarships, mission activities, and support for the Deacons' programs. By not touching principal in these accounts, Central will be able to rely on them for income generation for years to come.

PROGRAM ACCOUNT

The Program account is a specialpurpose account that was established in 2018 with the remainder of the large financial gift that Central received. At the time, Session designated this money as "one-time" program money that would be spent on three initiatives:

a. \$200,000 was designated for building repairs, and has been spent.



b. \$300,000 was designated for six years of "staff support" money to provide raises for key staff administrative, music, and children/ youth staff. We are now half-way into that spend. In three more years, Central will have to raise an additional \$60,000 per year in contributions to fund these raises, since the "one-time" Program money will have run out. However, Central's contributions have been trending slightly down, rather than up, over the last few years, so there is work to be done to fund these positions for the long-term, using sustainable, recurring funds.

c. \$600,000 was designated for six years of an associate pastor hire. Session's idea was to expand the pastoral staff using this "one-time" money, and provide six years in which to have that pastoral staff build church membership. An associate pastor was hired, but only stayed for one year. Then COVID hit; Rev.

Colby moved on; and decisions about hiring an associate pastor took a back seat to hiring a new, permanent pastor.

Earlier this year, the Session voted to take the remaining associate pastor money, and invest it for three years to help generate operating income for the church, while longer-term decisions about pastoral staffing are being made. While the investment restriction is in place, the "associate pastor" Program account principal cannot be spent, but income generated by those investments can be used. It is anticipated that this pool of money could generate an extra \$15,000 per year, which can be used to help

cover church operating expenses. That amount of income growth has not occurred quite yet, but the account is on track to be able to deliver that amount of money for 2022. This is why Program account funds cannot be used to fund improvements to our building and were not able to be used to move the children and youth position from part-time to full-time, as some members have inquired about.

TURNING TO GOD IN UNCERTAIN TIMES

One week in mid-August, the daily Psalm we read at the beginning of staff meeting was Psalm 42.

As a deer longs for flowing streams, so my soul longs for you, O God.

My soul thirsts for God, for the living God.

When shall I come and behold the face of God?

Why are you cast down,
O my soul, and why are you
disquieted within me?

Hope in God; for I shall again praise him, my help and my God.

The poetry of that Psalm spoke to me that day. I sensed other staff members were struggling with planning for September in the midst of so many uncertainties. In the midst of news about infection rates and of deaths in this country and around the world, it has been hard to keep a sense of hope.

ANTI-RACISM AND THE JUSTICE SYSTEM


On Central's Anti-Racism Task Force, we seek equitable justice under the law, but we have to acknowledge our state's wide racial disparities. For example, the website law.umn.edu offers "The Minnesota Paradox: A Discussion about Racial Disparities in the Criminal Justice System," based on a 2018 study.

Blacks were 6% of the general population, but 27% of the adult felonies and 36% of the prison population. Comparable figures for Native Americans were 2, 9 and 10 percent; Hispanic and Asian numbers were between 3 and 6 percent in all three categories. In contrast, whites were 84% of the general population but only 46% of the imprisoned, and accounted for 57% of the adult felonies.

Learning about life after incarceration has been only a small part of our efforts. Life after incarceration begins at least six weeks before release, I learned in a Minnesota Public Radio program, "Locked Out - The Path From Incarceration to Inclusion."

In my follow-up to the that broadcast, I exchanged emails with the mother of a young offender who had found the Power of People program helpful while he was at Faribault Correctional Facility; he participated in a six- week course before he left.

"My son didn't really participate in any reentry programs besides the support/assistance he received from the half-way house in St. Paul. I think work and school and re-connection



with family and a group of more stable friends helped him. He did get assistance for work clothes for a men's Dress for Success program. He attended a follow-up chemical dependency program. He now is in his third year at the University of Minnesota."

I first heard about Power of People on the MPR broadcast. It is one of the organizations that offer help in identifying resources to prepare for meeting challenges mentioned in the "Adult Pre-Release Handbook" available from the Minnesota Department of Corrections. Where will you live? What kind of work can you perform? What is your social network? Where can you turn for help?

In the MPR show, host Angela Davis interviewed Brother Shane M. Price, co-founder of The Power of People Leadership Institute. He is the lead trainer in the personal development and leadership training program that has been offered to offenders at the Minnesota Correctional Facility at Faribault since December 2005 and has since expanded to facilities in Lino Lakes, Moose Lake and Rush City. He also directs the program's two re-entry houses in north Minneapolis.

Other panelists provided further insight into other facets of re-entry. Lacking education, Josh Wilson endorsed the job training he received from the show's co-sponsor, Tech Dump, a leading recycler of electronic waste and job trainer/employer.

Nadine Graves, Hennepin County public defender, described discriminatory practices against nonwhites by public prosecutors and in housing. And Richard Lemore of Lemore Holdings, who was imprisoned as a teenager, described the challenges of being 37 and "learning everything" — how to drive, apply for a job, interact with the public. A prison workshop of the Alternatives to Violence Project (avpusa.or) was especially helpful.

To learn about other agencies assisting in post-incarceration reentry, I turned to JRLC (Joint Religious Legislative Coalition). Central Presbyterian Church is one of its member congregations, and I have been an individual member for many years.

Joan Miltenberger, statewide organizer, identified several other non-profits that assist with reentry, including:


